

UPDATE 7: AUGUST 2023

This is the latest cumulative update to the third edition of my book *London's Best Beer, Pubs and Bars*, published in November 2021 by CAMRA Books. It's a bumper issue with lots more additional full reviews and updates based on recent visits, though the trickle of brewery and other closures continues. The next update is due in November or December.

Growlers and takeaway draught beer. New UK duty arrangements in force from 1 August 2023 provide a discount for beer served from bulk containers for drinking on the premises. This is almost entirely good news for pubs, bars, breweries and drinkers, except that outlets, including beer festivals, won't now be allowed to sell beer bought at the lower rate in takeaway containers. This is likely to result in a major reduction, if not complete extinction, of growlers and similar containers, as these can now only be filled legally with beer on which full duty has been paid, and licensees are unlikely to keep a supply specifically for this purpose or forego the discount just so they can continue with draught takeaways which account for only a minority of sales. Pre-packed bottled and canned beers are unaffected as they don't attract the discount anyway, so pubs and bars can continue to sell them for drinking in or taking away. Though there's a chance that the government might be persuaded to address this unforeseen consequence of the new regulations in future, for the moment you'll simply have to enjoy your draught beer in the bar.

The additional entries follow the book format, though I've had to use substitutes for some of the symbols. In the travel details, **NR** means a National Rail station, **TfL** a station with rail services managed by Transport for London (Elizabeth Line, Overground, Underground, DLR), **Cy** a cycling route and **Wk** a walking route.

Each issue includes all changes to date, including those previously published. Following a suggestion by a Patreon supporter, every entry is tagged with a month and year. New or substantially revised entries are tagged as *08/23*.

Four keg beers might not seem much by this guide's standards, but what's interesting and praiseworhty is that this cheerful place at the end of Chapel Market has chosen to foreground a single nearby independent brewer with a small but smart range: the Goodness supplies an exclusive IPA plus its regular lager, stout and low alcochol beer, dispensed from uniformly branded taps. There's no cask: the handpumps behind the bar dispense cider and wine, so don't get your hopes up. Reopened in November 2023 by small restaurant group Hicce, which also owns the pizza place opposite, it's occupies a site that's been rebranded many times but was originally the Salmon and Compasses. There's a single long bar downstairs, tastefully furnished in contemporary style with greenery and bookshelves, and an airy dining room with a stained glass door upstairs. Italian sausage with radicchio or fish and chips might be on the bar menu; upstairs, expect the likes of broccoli and

chilli frittata, pigs head cromesqui or pork chops with peach and fennel salad. *08/23*

Pub trivia. Hicce is Latin for 'of the moment': they pronounce it 'heetchay' here but classical scolars will prefer 'ee-kay'.

NR Kings Cross, St Pancras International TfL Kings Cross St Pancras Wk Link to Jubilee Greenway, Jubilee Walkway

It's hard to avoid the cliché 'hidden gem' about this little oasis just off Caledonian Road and a short walk from Kings Cross station. Community owned since 2015, a two-star heritage pub and now an Asset of Community Value, it specialises in well-kept cask beer, good music and an unpretentiously friendly welcome. A smallish single drinking area is lined with 1930s wood panelling and decorated with a motley collection of stuffed animal heads, theatrical masks, brewery mirrors and other oddities. The small but immaculately kept selection of rotating casks favours Londoners like Hammerton, One Mile End and Park, or perhaps Kent Brewery. There's a dedicated keg line for Siren, plus more of that brewerv's beers in cans alongside low alcohol options. The free jukebox is justifiably described as "cracking". Featured in the first edition, it somehow slipped through the cracks thereafter, and I'm delighted to have rediscovered it. 08/22

UPDATES AND CORRECTIONS

Alma. Now One Mile End founder Patrick Mulligan's one remaining pub, this charming place still offers a reasonable range of beer despite OME's demise, including Deya, Paulaner, Portobello, Tiny Rebel and Verdant on keg and some surprising cans, like Polly's. Cask, sadly, has been discontinued, though food has been restored. *08/23*

Brewhouse and Kitchen Islington. Closed for extensive refurbishment to the building in September 2022 with no reopening date announced, hopefully temporary but likely over a year. *12/22* **Calthorpe Arms** (Try also). The longstanding leaseholder of this CAMRA favourite Young's pub moved on late in 2019 and the pub itself is now controlled by Punch. It was designated an Asset of Community Value (ACV) in January 2022, which partly protects its future as a pub, but it's no longer of particular beer interest. *08/23*

Little Creatures Regents Canal. The bar and brewery were included in the package of Lion/Kirin properties sold to Odyssey Inns/In Good Company in August 2022: see Fourpure under Southeast London: Bermondsey. Brewing was suspended and in late October the venue was renamed **Babel Beer House** with the web address changed to **babelbeerhouse.com**. On-site brewing was revived in March 2023 and there's usually one own-brewed beer from the tank, plus 12 keg lines and around eight cans mainly from sister breweries Fourpure and Magic Rock, with the occasional surprise like New Belgium. Flights are available; food is burgers and pizzas, including vegan options. *08/23*

Three Johns (Try also). One of the former Barworks pubs sold to Urban Pubs who reduced the beer range (see Exmouth Arms under Clerkenwell and Farringdon below) though its beer offer is still better than most other pubs in this group, including occasional cask, the likes of Deya, Goodness and Verdant among 12 kegs, and some bottled Belgian and German classics. *08/23*

The UK's biggest BrewDog bar really is big, a labyrinthine space on two levels at the back of The Sidings, the repurposed former international terminal beneath platforms 20-24 at Waterloo station. Besides various general seating areas patrolled by helpful and well-informed staff, there are quiet shared workspaces, a noisy duckpin bowling alley, a podcast studio, an actual working ice cream van parked on the upper floor and an outdoor street-level terrace beneath. Then, of course, there's the 5 hl brewhouse and four 10 hl fermenting vessels stationed alongside the main bar downstairs, where ex-Gipsy Hill brewer A J Robieson is given a free hand to innovate with interesting specials alongside a regular exclusive house pale ale. A smaller bar on the upper level offers a slightly different range: why not take the slide between them rather than the steps or lift? As is usual nowadays, the draught lists are mainly BrewDog plus a small handful of sour and mixed fermentation guests. Two well-stocked self-service fridges are appropriately labelled 'Train Beers', though their contents are available to drink in too. There are rather more guests here, including UK craft producers like Arbor, Beak, Dot and Northern Monk and a few big bottles of lambic and other mixed fermentation treats. BrewDog managers now see this as their flagship venue, and it's unarguably more interesting than the average station bar. But if you're looking for quiet sampling, you're probably better off at one of their more intimate outlets, particularly at busier times. 08/23

BEERS in keg include a relatively regular **Waterloo Gold** pale ale (4.5%), though I've not yet manged to catch it, and some wide-ranging specials, from hazy juicys to Festbier lagers and flavoured beers: **The Heat*** (5.8%) was likely the best ginger-flavoured beer I've tasted. Most is sold in-house but some goes to other BD bars.

NR TfL Elephant & Castle Bus Elephant Park Cy Link to C17, CS7

Upgraded from Try also. Between lockdowns and erratic opening hours, I didn't manage to appraise this place properly for the book under its original incarnation as Tap In. Following a reshuffle of ownership, it was rebranded in March 2023 and I'm glad I've finally had the opportunity to do it justice. It's a smallish craft beer and sports bar overlooking a green and pleasant public space amidst the major redevelopment of Elephant Park. Football is the focus, other sports get a look-in too, but even those resistant to the charms of competitive physical activity will find plenty of interest in an admirable beer offer expertly assembled by owner Seb. Kegs are a mix of contemporary stuff – pale ales, sours and a least one stout – from admired UK independents like Anspach & Hobday, Deya, Hackney, Pilot or Vault City, with some Belgian, German or Scandi imports. There's much more of the same, plus some Belgian classics, in the wellstocked fridges, available either to drink in or take away. The kitchen occasionally rotates but had interesting tacos and quesadillas when I called. An attractive round raised area lined with padded benches somehow converts into a bowling alley on Thursdays. *08/23*

Gladstone Arms

A smallish but lively pub just off Borough High Street, the Glad provides an appealing combination of interesting beer, Anglo-Indian food, a homely and relaxed atmosphere and a strong music focus. The L-shaped downstairs area is shaded pastel green with Indian murals and tables decorated with barley sprigs in jars. Up a staircase lined with old records is a petite roof terrace and a second room with a mirrored fireplace and 60s furniture. Casks might be from Moor or Sambrook's while a good spectrum of kegs, including a gluten-free option, takes in Coalition, Gipsy Hill, Hackney, Howling Hops or Toast, with a few from bigger brewers. There's plenty here to match dishes served in varying sizes from small plates to mains, like avocado papri chaat, Manchurian cauliflower, karaage chicken, Bengali spiced prawns, or a variety of pies with Indian-inspired fillings like goat keema or vegan options, with interesting beer snacks too. 08/22

Visitor note. In a 1920s building on a site that's been a pub since the 1850s, the Glad was threatened with demolition to make way for flats in 2015 but was saved by a vigorous local campaign and an Asset of Community Value designation. It was reopened in 2017 by best friends Gaurav Khanna, Megha Khanna and Abhinav Saxena. The landmark mural depicting a slightly sinister character on a side wall is currently hidden by a thick curtain of ivy.

This partnership between Mondo (p272) and pizza makers Joe Public occupies a small arch at Borough Yards, a recently refurbished complex of viaducts between Borough Market and Bankside which now hosts shops, bars and restaurants. Copper dispense tanks overlook the bar and small drinking area downstairs, with a comfier upstairs mezzanine and plentiful space outside. Mondo supplies nearly all the beers: this is a good showcase for their eclectic range, including an imperial stout when I called, appropriately given its location (see Visitor note). Pizzas, whole or by the slice. are topped with courgette and aubergine, mushroom and shallot and vegan options as well as bacon or pepperoni. It's on the edge of the Yards, on the corner of the west end of Clink Street on the Thames Path. 08/23

Visitor note. The Anchor pub opposite is the former brewery tap for Barclay Perkins Anchor brewery, a London porter producer that was once the biggest brewery in the world, particularly noted for its Imperial Russian Stout: see p90. The only other reminders are a few plaques and the handsome head brewer's house at 21 Park Street, recognisable by the prominent 'Take Courage' sign on its gable end.

'We'll only stock their beer if Jonathan [Dransfield, the owner] can cycle to them,' said a staff member, explaining the admirably local buying policy of this delightful under-the-radar beer emporium, book shop and events space on the ground floor of an old warehouse just off trendy Bermondsey Street. Practically every brewery with a presence within that radius seems to be represented, including Bianca Road, Brockley, Kernel, Small Beer, Villages and even a rare sight of Southwark bottles, in a wide range of styles too. It's a small but pleasant and friendly place with tables scattered among the shelves and some on the attractive street outside, yet they still manage to cram in a busy events programme, from poetry readings to live jazz. Originally Jonathan's architect's office, it began selling beer and books to the local community during the lockdowns and emerged in its current form in 2021. 08/23

Visitor note. The area was once a centre of both the tanning and printing industries, with the Leather Exchange just round the corner, thus Morocco Street, after a high-grade leather used to bind books. The bar name also nods to the 1942 musical comedy film *Road to Morocco*.

TRY ALSO

Jolly Gardeners 49 Black Prince Road SE11 6AB jollygardeners.co.uk. Featured in previous editions when it was German specialist Zeitgeist, this backstreet Lambeth boozer changed hands in 2021 and reverted to its traditional name. Still independently run and free of tie, it retains a decent German lager and wheat beer, plus six more kegs and around 15 bottles/cans mainly from south London brewers. One or two casks might appear on gravity on the bar itself in cooler weather. There's a substantial food menu too, though at gastro prices. *Mo* closed. *08/22*

Old Red Lion 42 Kennington Park Road SE11 4RS **theoldredlion.uk**. A former Antic that's now a Portobello, with a cask-focused manager maintaining four lines in good condition alongside nine keg, around half from the owning brewery, the rest from London and other UK independents. It's also an architecturally delightful three-star heritage pub preserving unashamed Brewer's Tudor features from a 1930s refit: fake beams, heavy timbers, stained glass and gothic styling. One to watch, next door to Oaka (p224). 08/22

Ship 171 Kennington Road SE11 6SF frontierpubs.co.uk. This well-refurbished Victorian corner pub with front terrace a short step from the Imperial War Museum is now a Frontier house, with up to two cask and nine decent kegs, including changing guests from London and other UK independents. If you can't find anything to suit, it's a short stroll along Kennington Road to BrewDog pub the Tankard and Fuller's crafty pub the Hercules (both Try also p89). 08/23

UPDATES AND CORRECTIONS

Beer Hawk. Closed December 2022. 05/23

Fountain and Ink (Try also). One of the Barworks pubs sold to Urban, this is now of considerably less interest with largely multinational-backed beers and no cask though a couple of indies among the kegs. *08/23*

Hop Locker. A recent visit confirmed this as a firm recommendation, especially considering its unusual site. Both the market and summer-only riverside bars are fully back in action. Both offer a good range of keg, both from UK independents and imported, usually with different beers on the different bars, and the market bar bottle selection stretches to sharers from the likes of Burning Sky, Jester King and Tilquin, all sold by well-informed and enthusiastic staff.

Mercato Metropolitano Elephant (German

Kraft). The market site is threatened with redevelopment so the brewery will eventually have to find a new home, though the timescale is uncertain: two planning applications have already been turned down. Meanwhile it continues to function as the main provider of German Kraft beers, alongside the smaller installations in Dalston and Mayfair which concentrate on specials. There's now a non-brewing outlet in Brixton: see Try also under Southwest: Brixton, Clapham and Streatham. 08/23 **Oaka (Mansion House)** should have been included in this section rather than in Southeast: Central South London. See below. *08/23*

Simon the Tanner (Try also). Changed hands in April 2023 and now operated by Disappearing Dining Club (also owners of the Dartmouth Arms: see North: Camden under Try also), though maintains a pleasant atmosphere and a reasonable selection of beer. New website at **disappearingdiningclub.co.uk/simon-the-tanner** and now open daily. Cash-free. *08/23*

St Felix Place changed its name to Flat Iron Square when it reopened in January 2022 with its outdoor space reconfigured, though remains under the same ownership and retains the link to Heineken. For a while the brewery produced Hop Exchange IPA (4.8%, not tasted) with the help of Brixton Brewing, though as of autumn 2022, brewing hasn't taken place for many months. It's a lively, noisy, party-minded venue in two cavernous arches. A choice of around 12 kegs comprises mainly Heineken-linked brands like Beavertown, Brixton and Lagunitas but also independents like Pillars and Big Smoke, alongside cocktails. The extensive vard houses five food trucks, currently including barbecue, pizza and Lebanese food. There are regular DJs, big screen sport and weekly pub quizzes. 12/22

Understudy. The bar is now run by Kerb (kerbfood.com), a company that operates markets featuring independent businesses and startups. They also manage an adjoining space, Kerb at the Understudy, with street food from popup operators. Sadly, the beer range has reduced somewhat, with all but a very small handful of bottles and cans now vanished, though the draught choice is if anything more independently minded. The tank beer is now supplied by Gipsy Hill, a lager exclusive to Kerb outlets, with nine kegs from brewers like Anspach & Hobday, BBNo, Great Beyond, Lost and Grounded and Verdant. Probably now more a Try also but still worth knowing about, especially considering its Southbank location. 08/23

NR Fenchurch Street TfL Aldgate Cy C2

Much as its surroundings in attractive Aldgate Square provide a welcome green oasis in the eastern end of the City, this delightfully sited latest in the Tap series significantly enhances the local beer offer. Rotating casks are often from Redemption, or perhaps Adnams or Iron Pier, while the kegs include the usual range of quality imported lagers and wheat beers, like unfiltered Budvar, with US craft from Stone and solid UK choices like Deva, New Bristol and Siren, in a range of styles. Authentic Chinese wheat and glass noodles, including vegan options, provide extra sustenance. The interior of this landmark contemporary building has mainly high-table seating and a smart and glossy veneer bar under a geometric ceiling, with further tables outside overlooking the water features. Weekend opening may be introduced in summer 2024, given the tourist population in the increasing number of City hotels. 08/23

Visitor note. Aldgate Square replaced a traffic-choked gyratory system in 2018, reclaiming much of the churchyard of adjoining St Botolph's Without Aldgate. The striking steel and glass Portsoken Pavilion was designed as a focus for the new and much-used public space. The toilets and kitchen in the basement occupy part of the former pedestrian subway.

TRY ALSO

Bolter Queen Street Place EC4R 1EB. Bloomsbury outlet opened October 2022, a smart but Spartan after-work haunt close to Cannon Street station. No cask and around 10 kegs, mainly quality German and Czech imports and Adnams beers, dispensed from a striking fountain of taps behind a central bar. *Sa-Su* closed. *08/23*

Kings Stores 14 Widegate Street E1 7HP **kingstores.co.uk**. Greene King-run City pub on a picturesque alley near Liverpool Street station, with locals and independents among five cask lines, and kegs that stretch to Paulaner and Signature. Open daily, unusually for the area. *08/23*

UPDATES AND CORRECTIONS

Bierschenke Beer House closed in July 2023 for redevelopment but has since opened a new site: see Try also under Central: Holborn and Covent Garden. *08/23*

Williams Ale and Cider House had already reduced its beer range. It was closed for refurbishment when I last visited so I'll check it again when it reopens in August 2023, but now likely to be no more than a Try also. *08/23*

NR TfL Farringdon

With its lush potted foliage, worn wood louvres and a massive back bar with stained glass and a paddle steamer figurehead, on a warm night this late night bar might just convince you you're beside the Mississippi and not the Fleet. Cylindrical copper bar mounts dispense keg beers sourced from highly-regarded modern British brewers like Burning Sky, Lost & Grounded, North and Wiper & True, with a Scandinavian import or two. Except for the odd stout, the selection leans a bit too much towards the pale side, but there's a fridgeful of bottles from the Kernel, Partizan and St Bernardus to explore. Barbecue wings and burgers are served with veggie and vegan options. Under the same management as the George and Monkey (p79), this figured in an update to the second edition but missed the third due to late reopening after the lockdowns. 08/22

Pub trivia. The name refers to a distinctive eastern administrative district of New Orleans known for its picturesque waterside settings, catastrophically flooded in the wake of Hurricane Katrina in 2005.

UPDATES AND CORRECTIONS

Exmouth Arms. Barworks sold this pub, along with 12 other venues, to Urban Pubs and Bars in October 2021. The beer range is now much reduced and largely sourced from bigger brewers, so no longer of particular interest. *08/23*

Farringdon Tap (Try also). A recent visit revealed that, the interest of the building aside, this currently has a more limited range than typical for the chain: only one cask when I called (Five Points or Thornbridge are popular), plus 13 keg, nearly all pale ales and lagers from London and Germany, and a sprinkling of bottled imports. There's a small but comfy mezzanine up the precarious spiral staircase and lots more space in the cellar, including a karaoke booth. 03/22

Jerusalem Tavern. Following the failure to renew the lease, this delightful place, listed in every edition of the Guide so far, closed in late February.

This was a disappointment for St Peter's Brewery. who created the pub and built its enviable reputation over more than 25 years. It reopened in March as the Holy Tavern, managed directly by the owners of the building, and I'm relieved to sav that, for now at least, it remains a worthwhile call. There's still a decent range of St Peter's beers alongside newcomers from London brewers Anspach & Hobday, in a range of styles, with up to three on cask; the bottle range has been dropped except for a couple of low alcohol and GF options. The charming appearance remains intact, though with some improvements behind the scenes. The kitchen was still getting back to speed when I visited but lunches and early evening meals should be available too. 08/22

Look Mum No Hands (Try also) closed in February 2023 but may revive as a pop-up. *08/*23

Smithfield Market Arms (Try also) was one of three London BrewDog outlets closed in September 2022 due to rising energy costs. *12/22*

NR Charing Cross TfL Charing Cross, Leicester Square

An essential call for sake (or nihonshu) enthusiasts, this little bar in the heart of Covent Garden is evangelical in the nicest possible way. The everchanging list, presented like a book of fabric swatches, explores the unexpected variety of the drink, from light, easy drinking and sparkling versions to the most complex and funky iunmai. from producers like Buyu, Dan Yamahai, Gunma Izumi and Rairaku. They're nearly all sold in 50 ml measures as well as bottles (also available to take away), with set flights to guide you, and tasty morsels like dumplings, fried pickles and more substantial bento boxes, including vegan and veggie options, for sustenance. It's a small, cozy place with a few tables and stools, so best visited at quieter times when patient staff will advise. But even when they're busy, every sake comes with a card giving tasting notes, suggested food matches and origin. There's also a couple of rotating bottled beers from Japanese craft brewer Baird, rare in London. It opened in November 2019, but I

couldn't visit before the book was published. For why I'm listing it at all, see Kanpai p273. 08/22

TRY ALSO

Bierschenke 50 Earlham Street WC2H 9LJ **bierschenke.co.uk**. Having lost its City site in 2022, this Bavarian-style beer hall reopened in June 2023 in the former Belgo Centraal site. Not yet visited but expect a reasonable range of decent Bavarian kegs and bottles and authentic food. Open daily, unlike its predecessor. *08/23*

Old Bank of England 194 Fleet Street EC4A 2LT **oldbankofengland.com**. Once a Fuller's pub, this is now a good option for sampling beers from Hertford's McMullens in central London, with cult AK light mild among up to three casks and a few kegs too. The Grade II-listed building did indeed once house a branch of the Bank of England and retains features like ornate ceilings and a gallery in a characterful interior, with a Routemaster bus marooned in the outdoor courtyard. *08/22*

UPDATES AND CORRECTIONS

Harp. Sorry to report that the much-admired sausage baps are now a thing of the past. *12/21*

Temple Brew House (Essex Street Brewing).

The pub remained closed for longer than expected after the lockdowns, prompting fears for its long-term future. But it eventually reopened in February 2022 and has been brewing again since May. Brewer Vanesa is now based at a sister brewpub in Cambridge but, as this has a smaller kit, she regularly visits London to brew longer runs. A good few own-brand beers once again number among four to six cask choices and around 11 kegs: they could be brewed here or at other sites, but staff can usually advise. The Essex Street brand is no longer used: all house beers now carry the pub name. *12/22*

Shoreditch and Hoxton

Brewhouse and Kitchen Hoxton and the Museum of the Home was founded by ex-Fourpure brewers John Driebergen (who has been brewing in London since 2011, initially with Meantime) and Ollie Parker. It occupies three adjacent arches under the Overground, one hosting a 10 hl brewhouse, another a spacious taproom with bench-style seating, its concrete floors softened by Turkish carpets and its friendliness extending to a permanent invitation to customers to suggest what they should brew next. All beers on sale are brewed in-house, with the most popular core brands dispensed from 500 I tanks at one end of the bar and more in keg, including lagers, pale ales, sours and porters, with a section of the blackboard dedicated to 'coming soon' beers. Pizzas are delivered by the ever-reliable Yard Sale, including vegan options. 08/23

BEERS in tank, keg and can include Kellerbierstyle **Hoxton Lager**^{*} (4.4%) and a tasty glutenfree West Coast pale ale, **Free Spirit** (4.9%), plus a variety of kettle sours in various flavours, some aged over wood chips. They're planning on adding a porter to the core range but still experimenting with recipes.

Griffin

Upgraded from Try also. When Urban bought out nearly all the Barworks venues in 2021, the beer range in most of them was disappointingly reduced, as recorded elsewhere in this update. The Griffin remains, though, as a proud exception thanks for enthusiastic staff, even retaining one cask line, usually Five Points, alongside a varied range of kegs, many from independents: Holy Ghost, New Bristol, Verdant, Wiper and True and Bavarian classics from Schneider were on when I last called. Then there's the bottle and can range, with a couple of decent lambics, Trappists, craft imports from Basqueland, Garage and Moa, British stuff from Burnt Mill and Overtone and even some sharers. All this is particularly pleasing as this is easily the best-looking outlet in the group, an atmospheric Victorian back street corner boozer with a one-star heritage listing, sympathetically restored to retain the imposing aged woodwork and sparkling mirrors. 08/23

Visitor note. The Grade II-listed pub was originally two separate buildings, thus the long, narrow footprint. Note the long counter and impressive mirrored back bar divided by columns reaching to Corinthian capitals and an elaborate frieze picked out in gold leaf, likely from the 1890s. The Meux brewery refaced the exterior in corporate brown tiling in the 1920s.

TfL Shoreditch High Street

This latest addition to London's small but growing band of sake specialists opened in July 2022 with what they claim is the UK's biggest range, including exclusive imports at reasonable prices, thanks to the Japanese owner's personal connections with the breweries, with British-brewed sake too from Kanpai and Sparking Sake. A few simple tables among the well-organised shelves in this discreetly elegant shopfront site make for a pleasant tasting environment. The menu is particularly helpful and informative, organised into 'soft and mellow', 'fruity and aromatic', 'aged and rich' and so on, at the various serving temperatures of chilled, room and (occasionally) warm. Staff offer exemplary advice and guidance, and if somehow the by-the-glass menu doesn't provide enough choice, all bottles are available to drink in too. Canned Monsuka Okinawa Dry is the only conventional beer on offer. 08/23

UPDATES AND CORRECTIONS

BrewDog Old Street (Try also) was one of three London BrewDog outlets closed in September 2022 due to rising energy costs. *12/22*

Crown and Shuttle (Try also) has reduced its range, focusing on lagers and pale ales, and the choices on its two remaining cask lines are uninspiring. It's still worth a look for Meantime tank lager and some good keg from smaller London local breweries among its 16 lines, with the odd bottle of Kernel or Partizan in the fridge. *08/23*

Goose Island Brewpub. Sold by AB InBev to Urban in September 2022 and renamed the **Queens Head**. Brewing was suspended and the brewers made redundant, but the kit remains in place and the new owners are considering leasing it to a third party or parties as the cost of removal is high. The beer interest is notably reduced but still includes the likes of Deya and Vault City among around 10 kegs, and at the time of writing they still have supplies of the barrel-aged barley wine the previous owners brewed here, which reaches the bar occasionally, plus some Belgian and German bottled classics. Now more a Try also. 08/23

Several former Barworks pubs originally listed in this section have been sold to Urban: see Exmouth Arms under Clerkenwell and Farringdon above. Of these, the **Griffin** is the only one that's really kept the faith with craft beer, and I've upgraded it from Try also to a new full entry above. The **Commercial Tavern** has become a try also at best, with one cask line, often Redemption, a few Belgian and German bottles and kegs largely from bigger producers. The **Singer Tavern** now has a disappointingly mainstream range; the **Well and Bucket** has two or three indie kegs and the odd Belgian bottle but no cask. Both were Try alsos and no longer merit a listing. *08/23*

Howl at the Moon is still well worth a look: a borderline main entry as it's such an attractive pub with 12 keg lines largely from well-chosen independents and in a variety of styles, including nearby Great Divide. Bottles and cans have dwindled, except for a supply of VB for rugby-playing Antipodeans among the regulars. No cask. *08/23*

Old Fountain. The brewery has been inactive since November 2019, first due to lack of time then the disruption of Covid. There's a long-term aspiration to restore it, but this is unlikely to happen anytime soon. The pub remains an excellent beer destination nonetheless. *03/22*

Pivo. 'Closed until further notice' July 2022 and now doesn't look like it will reopen, a sad end for one of London's most interesting bars. *08/*23

TfL Great Portland Street

Longstanding cuckoo brewer and food waste campaigner Toast Ale has had a taproom since

March 2023, in collaboration with fellow social enterprise, coffee seller Change Please. It's in the slightly unexpected but not unpleasant surrounds of the swanky Regents Square development, just off Euston Road on the north side near Great Portland Street, at the foot of a tower block overlooking a guiet contemporary-style garden square. Dependent on local offices for footfall, it's essentially a davtime café, a relatively large but friendly and cheerful space with bright colours, greenery and Scandi-style furniture, opening at 08.00 for coffee and pastries with the license kicking in at 12. But it offers comprehensive coverage of Toast's expanding range on keg, including regular pale ales, lager and stout, collaborations and guests from like-minded businesses like Tap Social. And on Thursdays, the peak after-work drinking slot in today's home working world, it metamorphoses into a bar, sometimes with special events and even the odd cask appearing, announced through social media. 08/23

TfL Great Portland Street Cy C27

Founded by Luke Boase in 2018, this cuckoo brewer of a much-admired unfiltered alcohol-free lager is London based and should really have been listed as a brewer without a brewery in the book. It particularly caught my attention by unexpectedly, though pleasingly, reopening a longclosed Fitzrovia pub, the former Masons Arms, in March 2023. The company's offices are on the upper level of this small but imposing Victorian corner site, with a lovingly refurbished interior downstairs, including engraved glass, a vertical drinking area in front of the bar and a relaxed space with tables and a tiled fireplace off to the side. The single flagship brand features alongside several noand low-alcohol choices, as you'd expect, but conventional beer and other drinks are on sale too. The range is relatively small but clearly well thought out: one of the managers was keen to explain the logic of it. Cask usually includes Taylor Landlord and a changing guest (from Tiny Rebel when I called), with keg lagers and pale ales, perhaps from Pillars or Northern Monk, and a sub-3% line, say Kernel Table Beer. Cans and bottles are all low-or-no. The barbecue menu hadn't quite

been confirmed when I called. The house beer, incidentally, is made at a historic Bavarian brewery but the company is coy on the details. *08/23*

HERITAGE PUB

Flying Horse 6 Oxford Street W1D 1AN nicholsonspubs.co.uk. The most impressive heritage treasures of the last pub standing on Oxford Street, rebuilt in 1893 in Flemish Renaissance style, are towards the back. A boldly coloured stained-glass skylight illuminates polished mahogany panels and pilasters framing elaborate painted mirrors, decorative tiled panels, illustrated ceiling roundels and fanciful allegorical paintings of women representing three of the four seasons ('Winter' somehow got lost over the decades) by Belgian artist Felix de Jong, known for providing similar works to music halls. Beers are on the more varied side for Nicholson's too, often with a couple of unusual guests among the casks. *08/23*

UPDATES AND CORRECTIONS

Newman Arms. The owner and its beers have been rebranded Big Penny: see the update for Truman's under East London: Hackney. The pub was up for sale in autumn 2022 though is still open and trading as normal. *05/23*

On a quiet street in deepest Marylebone, this gem of a smallish traditional pub offers a warm welcome and a relatively small but well-sourced and impeccably kept beer selection in an attractive setting with considerable historical interest. Casks rotate regularly, with familiar brands like Fuller's and Sharp's in the minority in favour of trusted independents like East London, Portobello, Redemption, Wantsum or Windsor & Eton. Three guest keg lines rotate monthly, sourced from these and similar brewers, while the regular taps include notables like Lucky Saint and Salt. It's a three-star heritage pub, not a glitzy gin palace but a more modest and charming example with plenty of well-aged wood and several unique features, notably a large wooden box on one side of the bar that turns out to conceal a couple of tiny private booths. An atmospheric panelled room at the back harbours brass plaques showing outdated prices and a well-used dartboard. *08/23*

Visitor note. The Grade II listed building dates from 1791, though most of the historic interior features are late Victorian, with the door layout indicating there were once further subdivisions. Also note the brass tap in the rear bar labelled Old Tom, a sweeter type of gin that would once have been dispensed from a barrel stored above.

NR TfL Paddington Cy C27 Wk Jubilee Greenway

In a welcome sign of post-lockdown confidence, the ever-excellent Craft Beer Co opened this latest outlet in November 2022, significantly improving the beer options in the relatively barren western side of central London. It's the group's first outlet near a major rail terminal, just a short walk from Paddington's new Elizabeth Line platforms and not much further from the rest of the station complex. And it's the first to have a proper pub name, the origin of which will be obvious to anyone familiar with British children's literature and film. The building wasn't originally a pub, though, but a bank and then a wine bar. The compact interior has been thoroughly refitted in the group's usual relaxed but contemporary style, in tasteful pale green and pink, with striking light fittings and a mix of booths and tables. Casks include the regular house pale from Kent brewerv and rotating guests, from Redemption, Siren and Vibrant Forest when I called, in a range of styles. An eyecatchingly lengthy tap mount hosts a regiment of kegs, again covering numerous style bases, mainly from British brewers like Deya, Double Barrel, Mammoth, Moor and Wiper & True, with imports like Dugges, Grimm and St Bernardus. Fine Belgians largely occupy the bottle fridge, including reasonably priced lambics from the likes of 3 Fonteinen, Cantillon and Lambiek Fabriek, Trappists and gems like Poperings Hommelbier. An additional basement space is sometimes reserved for private groups; next to it is a surprisingly small glass-fronted cellar. 08/23

TfL South Kensington Bus Carlyle Square Chelsea

The lavish refurbishment of this handsome Chelsea pub, reopened in July 2021, was backed with serious gastro credentials, with veterans of Michelin-starred establishments among the kitchen team. But pleasingly, it's remained a proper, if very posh, pub, with a decent-sized drinking area at the front and big screen sport downstairs. A range of well-kept cask leans perhaps overmuch to traditional bitters, though it was good to see Marlow Rebellion and Thornbridge Lord Marples on when I called. There's more variety on keg: the house pilsner is an exclusive collaboration with Harbour and there are sours and other unusual choices from the likes of Partizan, Verdant and Yonder. Typical dishes include oysters, mussels, pickled vegetables, pies filled with the likes of wild mushroom and barley or ham hock and chicken, lamb ribs, steaks, paneer makhana and even 70s staple prawn cocktail, all made with carefully sourced ingredients. As expected in this area, a sit-down meal will set you back, though a limited selection is available in the bar area at (slightly) lower prices. As things stand, the beer selection probably wouldn't quite merit a full listing in the book, though enthusiastic bar staff tell me they're working on a bottle and can list, and it's always good to see food-led projects like this put some thought into the beer side. 03/22

Visitor note. With its ornate tiles, floor mosaics, patterned ceiling festooned with chandeliers and spectacular carved wood and stained glass back bar, this looks like a lovingly restored heritage pub. In fact, though some of the wood panelling is original, uncovered during the refurbishment, the rest is largely a recent artful pastiche. There's been a pub on the site, originally known as the Rose and Crown, since the 17th century; the current building is from 1836, though the ground floor façade with its red marble pilasters looks late Victorian.

Globe

NR TfL Marylebone

Until now unnoticed, at least by me, this craft beer bar in the shell of a Victorian corner pub is a welcome option close to Marylebone station. There's only one rotating cask, though often from an unusual source (Docks in Grimsby when I called), and while the kegs feature several big brewery brands and a preponderance of pales and lagers, there's rarer stuff that might be from BBNo. Beak. Gritchie, Track or Two Flints, plus Chouffe and Duvel. Fridges widen the choice considerably, with cans from Deya, Fierce, Polly's, Verdant and Squawk, with darker, stronger and sour options plus a few more Belgians. Décor in the single bar area is largely bare and painted brick, with a good mix of seating including a corner with an tempting collection of multicoloured cushions. It's understandably popular with staff from the large BNP Paribas office across the road. 08/23

TRY ALSO

Barley Mow (Mayfair) 82 Duke Street W1K 6JG **cubitthouse.co.uk**. Handsome smallish woody traditional pub off Grosvenor Square, now run by upmarket Cubitt House group. Small selection – two casks, six kegs – but almost all from interesting locals and independents. *08/23*

UPDATES AND CORRECTIONS

Bolton/Proeflokaal Rembrandt. Closed in September 2022 when operator M&B's lease expired and the owners of the building opted not to renew it, a great shame for a landmark pub with a beer offer unique in London. *12/22*

Mercato Metropolitano Mayfair (German Kraft).

A recent visit to this impressive central London retail site in a converted church, now known simply as Mercato Mayfair, found German Kraft head brewer James Mozolewski hard at work with a smoked Bock on the little 2.5 hl kit at one end of the crypt. As this is the smallest of the group's three brewpubs, it concentrates on such specials. which have also included traditional Berliner Weissbier and a Dampfbier using wheat beer yeast with 100% barley malt. It's an atmospheric place to drink too, under the low vaulted brick ceiling, but note the downstairs bar by the brewhouse is often closed earlier in the week when brewing is in progress. The upstairs bar, right in front of the high altar and made from recycled bottle glass, is open throughout with a slightly wider range, and there's plenty of seating shared with the other traders. Note the dispense tanks are currently out of commission, so all beer is keg. 08/23

Mall Tavern (Try also). The Project 88 brand is no longer used (as reported elsewhere p327: I missed this correction when putting together the final text for the book). But the Mall and its related venues are likely sources of beer from Standard Brew Co, founded by a former Project 88 brewer: see Brewers without breweries below. *08/22*

Royal Exchange (Try also). As of January 2022, the pub is no longer under the same management as the Priory Arms and Grosvenor. It's still a friendly traditional place with a couple of unexpected keg choices but no cask and no longer of particular interest to readers of this guide. *03/22*

Thornbury Castle (Try also). Following the departure of the previous leaseholder, this reopened in February 2022 as a Stonegate managed pub and has largely lost its beer interest. *08/23*

TfL Hackney Central, Hackney Downs Cy Q2

Upgraded from Try also. Ideally located adjacent to the patio beside St John's church in central Hackney, just round the corner from several breweries, this is a new departure for the group behind the Euston Tap, previously focused on central London sites close to busy stations. But with an admirably varied range of cask and keg sourced either very locally (East London, Five Points, Hackney) or from more northerly independents (Hawkshead, Thornbridge, Twisted Wheel), it's a worthy addition. As indicated by the display of Germanic beer mugs, imported lagers feature, among them Oechsner Helles and unfiltered Budvar. An interior lit by arched windows offers high banquettes and tables and a few lower tables too. Freshly fried gyozas with both vegan and meaty fillings are a nice touch. 03/22

Visitor note. Built as a private house in 1802, the Grade IIlisted building served as Hackney's first town hall in the mid-19th century. It was subsequently used as a branch of the Midland Bank and, more recently, a betting shop.

TfL Hackney Wick Cy Link to NCN1 Wk Link to Capital Ring, Jubilee Greenway, Lee Valley Path, Olympic Park paths

This big but long-unloved pub just round the corner from Hackney Wick station reopened in July 2021 as the most beer-friendly venue in the Electric Star chain, thanks to an enthusiastic manager. Cask, very well-kept when I've called, might be from Moor, while alongside the bigger 'craft' brands on the keg taps you should find locals like Boxcar, Brick and Pressure Drop, plus low alcohol Lucky Saint, with Exale, Gravity Well, Kernel, Lost and Grounded, Siren and others lurking in a slightly chaotic beer fridge. Spicy krapow chicken leads the current menu, with Thai burgers, noodles and 'son in law' eggs, including numerous veggie and vegan options. It's sufficiently funky to match its location: a contemporary interior includes traditional flourishes like a mirrored back bar, tiled bar surround and fireplace, with comfortable corners and a delightful roof terrace where you can drink beside the chimneypots. 08/22

Visitor note. The former Ind Coope pub had been closed since 1995, and become a crumbling, graffiti-encrusted local landmark. Squatted in the early 2000s, it was used as an illegal rave venue, and an attempt to turn it into an art complex foundered. The current owners have preserved most of the graffiti, considering the building itself a work of art.

UPDATES AND CORRECTIONS

BBNo Netil Market is now closed. There's still some craft beer on the market – a handful from keg and can at the Lucky Chip burger stall – but nothing worth a special trip. 08/23

Brew Club. Closed March 2023. 05/23

Crate Brewery. The old kit had been removed by early 2023 with no news of brewing resuming. Cuckoo brewing continues and the pub still has a good range of beer. 08/23

Crown and Castle (Try also). One of the sites sold by Barworks to Urban Pubs in 2021 and now of little beer interest: see Exmouth Arms under Clerkenwell and Farringdon. *08/23*

Experiment. Closed July 2023 when its operators were unable to negotiate a new lease. *08/23*

Five Points Brewing. The indoor taproom at the brewery finally opened in November 2021 when the popular tours (advance booking essential) were reintroduced, with the result that the site is even more deserving of its selection as a top London brewery experience as well as a great place to drink. The indoor bar opens directly off Mare Street: it's cheery, comfortable and decently sized, with a mix of high and low seating. A dedicated passageway equipped with picnic tables runs right through the brewhouse into a sizeable yard beneath the rail viaduct, with plenty of seating, including some in sheltered booths, and an

additional container bar: it merits a 'very good garden' rosette for its size, facilities and atmosphere. You can also view the brewing equipment from an upstairs mezzanine bookable for private events. The main bar offers two Five Points beers from cask, five from 500 I horizontal tanks behind the bar, and seven keg lines which might include guests like Beak, Belleville, Brick, Duration or Orbit. The container bar usually has one or two extra small batch specials made on the pilot kit. A few more house beers are sold in bottles and you can also pick up cases of the core brands. In May 2023, the extensive yard stretching to rail arches at the back was refurbished as the Five Points Courtyard, with a variety of food traders.

London Fields Brewery. On 8 December 2021, owners the Carlsberg Marston's Brewing Company (CMBC) unexpectedly announced that the brewery and taproom were closing with immediate effect and being placed on the market along with the brands. Contract brewing at Camerons would continue until the sale was complete. After almost 18 months in mothballs, CMBC confirmed in May 2023 that the new owner was beer-friendly pub group Graceland, who plan to resume brewing under a new brand, **Saint Monday**. *08/23*

Mammoth Beer. Deprived of taproom space at the brewery itself, Mammoth opened an off-site showcase by Leytonstone High Road station in April 2022: see Stratford to Walthamstow. *08/22*

BEERS in keg and can, now tasted, include **Prism** lager (4.4%), **Wax** hazy pale ale (4.8%) and a stronger, also hazy, IPA, **Echo*** (6.2%). Flavoured sours regularly change.

Mermaid. The pub never reopened following flood damage and is currently up for sale. *08/22*

People's Park Tavern (Laine's Brew Lab). The brewhouse was removed early in 2022 and the space converted to customer use, so all Laine beers on sale reverted to products form the main brewery in Sussex. I've heard reports the beer range has been reduced, with cask rarely available, so this may no longer be a worthwhile recommendation. Laine first said it planned to re-install the brewery in a standalone unit nearby, but in October expanded its brewing capacity elsewhere by buying Redchurch brewery in Harlow (itself with London origins) so whether this project will be pursued remains to be seen. The Laine brand has since inherited another pub brewery at the Ram Inn. Wandsworth: see Southwest London. 05/23

Three Sods Brewery. Following a struggle to recover from the lockdowns, the brewery closed in August 2022. The head brewer moved on in 2021 and production was kept going with one of the founders, who has a full-time job, brewing at weekends, making it impossible to open the taproom. A sad loss of one of London's most charming breweries. 08/22

Truman's Beer. The company underwent several complex changes in response to the knock-on effects of the lockdowns and problems with premises. It had to give up the former Crate brewery in Queens Yard, again due to redevelopment, with brewing ceasing in May 2022. Unfortunately, it was still not able to install a new brewery at Blackhorse Lane, so shifted to contract brewing. I believe at Redchurch in Harlow. To raise money, it sold the Truman brand in September to the owners of the Old Truman Brewery in Brick Lane, and has since rebranded itself as Big Penny, acknowledging a former copper mill close to the Blackhorse site which supplied materials for penny coins. Its three venues remain open, though two have been rebranded (see under Central London: Soho and Fitzrovia. East London: Stratford to Walthamstow and London City Airport). All beers are currently in keg, with no cask at least for the time being. It remains to be seen whether the new owners of the Truman brand will commission beers under that name. 12/22

Levtonstone is developing into the latest London beer destination, with the Filly Brook, Mammoth Tap Room, North Star and Stone Mini Market, all listed below, within easy walking distance and Gravity Well (p146) a slightly longer walk or short bus or Overground ride away. 08/22

Upgraded from Try also. Opened in April 2021. this is now the biggest Clapton Craft, offering the widest range, in a building that includes the company's warehouse and offices. Much more than a shop, it's a decent-sized bar in a clean-lined Scandinavian-style space with a picture window, and even more inviting booth-style seating round the side. The house lager is a collaboration with Braybrooke; otherwise, the changing keg range includes local brewers and sour, darker and stronger options. Bottles and cans are all in fridges, some of them accessed US-style from a rear coldroom. Londoners are strongly represented by Affinity, Boxcar, Drop Project, East London, Exale, Gravity Well, Partizan, Pressure Drop and Signature among others, alongside outliers like Baron, Burnt Mill, Overtone, Time and Tide, Unity and Unbarred. Imports are largely limited to Belgian and German classics, with only a small handful of recherché sharers. While the drinking space at the N4 branch (p179) has a little more charm, this one is unarguably now one of the capital's top beer destinations. 03/22

Filly Brook

TfL Leytonstone

A former air cadet training hut in a residential Leytonstone street now provides one of London's more pleasingly quirky surroundings for serious beer sampling. The brainchild of Simon Purnell, who also campaigns locally on development issues, Filly Brook began as a popup in 2015 and finally opened in a permanent home in February 2020, just weeks before the lockdowns. Normal service has since been resumed and it's become a much-appreciated local resource. An attractive interior is done out in stripped pine, overlooked by two massive vintage Tannoy hi-fi speakers, with an amenable courtyard beyond. An inspired beer list covers a range of styles, including saisons, porters and stouts, wheat beers and even a barley wine when I called, from locals like Gravity Well, Solvay Society and Pretty Decent or other UK producers like Lost and Grounded or Polly's. Collabs with local brewers are a regular feature. Bottles and cans are mainly quality low alcohol options but there are a few strong and unusual sharers. The kitchen was occupied by a Malaysian street food outlet when I called, but this changes every few months. A delight. 08/22

Visitor note. Built in the late 1930s, the hut was used more recently as a children's nursery but had to close as the fabric was dangerously decayed, after which it was intermittently squatted. The council planned to sell it for demolition and redevelopment until Simon persuaded them otherwise. The Filly Brook, also spelt Fillebrook or Philly Brook, is one of London's lesser-known lost rivers which runs close by.

A little smarter than your average arch taproom, Mammoth's outlet under the Overground a few steps from the ticket barriers at Leytonstone High Road station boasts Scandinavian-style furnishings, striking photographic displays by a local artist and cool colour-changing light bulbs in Chinese lantern shades. The current tap range focuses on house brews but when the full complement of 12 is connected, there will be guests, some of whom are already represented in a particularly wellstocked fridge, with a range of styles mainly from Londoners like Drop Project, Howling Hops, Kernel, nearby Solvay Society and Villages. This is an off-site facility: the brewery remains based in Hackney Wick (see Hackney). *08/22*

This pretty one-star heritage pub in a quiet residential street just off Leytonstone High Road and a short walk from a patch of Epping Forest is now even prettier, with a little fenced-off patch of tables reclaimed from the road at the front. The beer range has improved too: a free house for 20 years, it's long been a local CAMRA favourite, but new manager Kieran (ex-Beavertown) has added some more contemporary flavours. Oakham JHB is the only regular on cask, joined by traditional bitters from Butcombe, Harvey's or Timothy Taylor and guests that might be from Five Points, Newbarns or Redemption. Newbarns also supplies a regular keg pils and stout, alongside the likes of Deya Steady Rolling Man or Senne Tara Boulba. The interior, noted of 'some regional importance', boasts an atmospheric narrow main bar furnished mainly with shelves and stools, and a bigger space with tables alongside it. There's a pizza stand in the garden as well as a Thai kitchen, both operated by third party partners, with plenty of veggie and vegan options. *08/22*

Visitor note. The oldest pub in Leytonstone village was converted from two cottages in 1858. It's neither named after the celestial body nor the steam locomotive depicted on the sign, but the ship that took the first licensee to India. Vintage engraved glass on the front doors reveals the current main bar was originally the saloon.

Adrienne began selling craft beer at the Leytonstone corner off-license she ran with her husband in 2015, because customers asked for it. Their interest grew to the extent that in August 2020 they took on two neighbouring shop units by the Overground station: one as a well-stocked bottle shop with drink-in seating, the other as an ethical food store, plus a labyrinth of additional rooms that stretch back to a small sheltered garden, including a civilised drinking space with elegant tables and the work of local artists on display and a sewing room and library. They tend to stock comprehensive ranges from favoured brewers: neighbours like Gravity Well and Pretty Decent, but also Beak, Exale, First Chop, Howling Hops, Kernel, Polly's, Shindigger, Sureshot and many more, including Belgians like Kasteel and St Bernardus. Run with obvious passion, it's yet another muststop in a beer-friendly area. 08/23

Upgraded from Try also. This solid neighbourhood pub was refurbished and reopened by the nearby Wild Card brewery as an outlier of the Blackhorse beer cluster in April 2021 and, though it's been left unbranded, it's a great showcase for their beers. Particularly welcome are the rarely spotted cask best bitter and pale ale, alongside varied keg options stretching to sours and darker beers, plus canned low alcohol brews from Lowtide in Brighton, Indoors is a friendly, comfortable single space punctuated with greenery and pillars, and there's extensive outdoor seating around three sides of the building. When I called, food from the popup kitchen was in substantial south Mexican style with tacos, burritos, quesadillas and burgers, including vegan jackfruit versions. 03/22

Visitor note. Previously known as the Higham Hill Tavern and, more recently, the Warrant Officer, the pub has a historical connection with Wild Card: in its early days in 2013, the then-cuckoo brewery briefly used the cellar as a storage space. Solvay Society brewed on a small scale here the following year. Note the old Warrant Officer pub sign and, if you can, the unusual window painting in the men's toilets.

Beer + Burger Walthamstow, mentioned in a previous update, is currently 'temporarily closed' and may not reopen. *08/23*

Birds (The) 692 High Road Leytonstone E11 3AA **thebirds.pub**. Deliberately distressed and stripped back Laines pub in Leytonstone town centre, preserving some stained glass. 12+ keg lines and a few cans, mainly Laines, Signature and occasional exotic guests. Cask unlikely. Originally the Crown, currently named after the film by local lad Alfred Hitchcock. *08/22*

Nags Head 9 Orford Road E17 9LP **thenagsheade17.com**. This much-loved community local in pretty Walthamstow village, round the corner from Pillars and several other places of interest, fell through the cracks of the last edition thanks to the lockdowns. Still overseen by veteran cat-loving landlady Flossie, it now stocks well-kept Taylor Landlord plus two usually local guests on cask, some big brand 'craft' kegs and a bottle and can selection that includes Magic Spells and local low alcohol specialist Nirvana. *08/23*

UPDATES AND CORRECTIONS

Beerblefish. The brewery completed its move to Blackhorse Lane in October, and in November bought a bigger 25 hl brewhouse formerly at BBNo's Bermondsey site. *12/21*

Exale added a second outlet in March 2023 when it reopened the former Fugitive Motel in Bethnal Green as the Three Colts Tavern: see East London: Tower Hamlets. *05/23*

Gravity Well. The brewery relocated operations to Tottenham in March 2023 – see North London: Tottenham and Haringey below – though has retained its attractive Leyton taproom in a shallow arch a few paces from Leyton Midland Road station, now with expanded hours and a small but pleasant outdoor terrace. Up to 10 keg lines and around the same number of cans are now almost entirely own-brewed except for a lager and a low alcohol option. There's no food but they're happy for you to order in meat-free deliveries, with supplier recommendations provided. *08/23*

Leyton Technical. Closed and repossessed by the landlord in October 2022 due to rent arrears accumulated during the lockdowns, though operators Antic are hopeful that it may reopen. *12/22*

Magic Spells. I've belatedly discovered that the company gave up its venue space, where it also brewed on a small scale, by July 2021. It's moved to a new site at an undisclosed location, likely outside London. *03/22*

Neckstamper Brewing has extended its taproom hours, at least for the summer. \bigcirc *Fr* 14.30-18.00, *Sa* 14.00-19.00. *08/23*

Pretty Decent Beer Co. Production was relocated in December 2022 to a bigger facility among the Blackhorse breweries, just round the corner from Signature (p151) and Big Penny and next door to Pinter/Greater Good. It's a cheerful space in front of the new 15 hl brewhouse, with a preponderance of pink, a mirrored bar and some fun murals. Nearly all the beers are produced inhouse, including a low alcohol option, with a gulten-free beer to follow. One of the old Wanstead arches has been retained as a bar, a small but well-organised space with the same cheerful colour scheme and a mix of tables, booths and stools, much-valued by locals. *08/23*

Refurbished and reopened just before the 2020 lockdowns as the latest Graceland venue, this prominently located pub isn't quite as aesthetically charming as its sister the Kings Arms round the corner but offers a similarly wide beer range poured by well-informed staff. Locals like Boxcar, Five Points and Redemption figure on the handpumps, while the very varied keg list might include Exale and the Kernel, Newbarns or Wylam from further afield and imports like Westmalle Dubbel. A seriously interesting bottle and can selection stretches to wild and mixed fermentation sharers from international names like American Solera. Cantillon and Loverbeer alongside local barley wines. Enjoy while grazing on small plates like crispy pigs ears and Welsh rarebit or more substantial options like vegan Irish stew or smoked duck Caesar salad. Behind the sturdy late Victorian exterior of this former Charrington pub is a stripped-out, mildly distressed single space with stout wooden tables and dark green décor, and a cheerful terrace with wooden decking at the back. 03/22

As its name suggests, this smart but relaxed space evolved from an initiative to supply the community during the lockdowns. Local resident and beer expert Alan was asked to advise on the craft beer side and has focused on nearby suppliers, with regular appearances by 40FT, Deviant & Dandy, Exale, Gravity Well, Hackney Church, Pillars and Signature on the keg taps and in a wellstocked fridge. Food includes blue rice bowls with satay chicken or grilled aubergine, or kolo mee pork belly. Contemporary décor and a strategic mezzanine make the best of a slightly awkward shape on the corner of a new block: it's light, draped with greenery and surprisingly spacious. The extensive outdoor seating overlooks a pedestrianised square in the curiously isolated surrounds of City Island, a recent development within a tight horseshoe meander of the river Lea just before it joins the Thames. 08/23

Listed in the book as the Fugitive Motel, which closed in July 2022, this unit at the foot of a new block opposite Bethnal Green Gardens was reopened by Walthamstow's acclaimed Exale brewery in February 2023, pleasingly reclaiming the name of an earlier pub on the site, demolished in 1902 but still remembered in street names. The new owners have pleasingly inclined the obviously modern space towards a more pubby feel, with old-school wooden banquettes and armchairs among the concrete pillars and cacti, a retro nameboard above the bar and a portrait of Karl Marx, who is also commemorated in the nearby library, gazing down on the proceedings. Besides the owner's beers, it stocks numerous guests from breweries like By the Horns, Gravity Well, Pressure Drop or Redemption, a few Belgian and German bottled classics, big bottles from the likes of Burning Sky and exotica like Hitachino Nest. Pizza is by Dough Hands and includes vegan options. Exale plan further sites. 08/23

UPDATES AND CORRECTIONS

Boxcar Brewery. Sadly, this excellent brewery, one of the most noteworthy of more recent arrivals on the London scene, closed on 23 February 2023 "due to an unworkable situation with our landlords, partly due to the pandemic and overhanging debt". The company was placed into administration but founder Sam Dickison was able to retain ownership of the brands. He's since revived production as a cuckoo, so the iconic dark mild is still available, and hopes eventually to open another physical site. *08/23*

E5 Poplar Bakehouse. I understand brewing hadn't restarted by the end of 2022, though the company has recently collaborated several times with the Kernel, making kvass in Bermondsey using E5's waste bread. If/when onsite brewing restarts, I'll report in more detail. *05/23*

Fugitive Motel. Now operated by Exale as the Three Colts Tavern: see full review above. 08/23

Old Street Taproom. This closed in November 2021 as the brewery was finding it uneconomic. The taproom at the main site in Hackney Wick (p138) remains open. *01/22*

BrewDog Upminster 18 Station Road, Upminster RM14 2UD **brewdog.com**. Unusually suburban for BrewDog but a major widening of choice in the area, this friendly bar opened in November 2022 in a converted bank just a short walk from Upminster station. 28 keg, 35+ bottles/cans, nearly all house brands but a wide range, some unusual guests and a great roof terrace. *08/23*

Mother Kellys Barking/IG11 3 Barking Wharf Square, Barking IG11 7HZ **motherkellys.co.uk**. No date has yet been announced for this latest addition to the MK family but it should be open shortly, promising a similar experience to the Stratford outlet, more bar-like in style but still with a great range of beer on an attractive site beside the river Roding near the ruins of Barking Abbey. Very welcome in an area where other beer options are limited. *08/23*

HERITAGE PUB

Boleyn Tavern 1 Barking Road E6 1PW **boleyntavern.co.uk**. Reopened in June 2021 following a lavish restoration, this 1899 gem is almost as jaw-dropping as the same owner's Salisbury (p193). The original seven-room layout has been recreated with the surviving original carved wood and decorated glass screen back where it should be and used as the model for several new reproductions. Don't miss the tiled lobby opening onto Barking Road, the tiny 'carriage bar' with a single table, and the stained-glass skylights, with the biggest in the rear restaurant, formerly with a billiard room and now with a charming little outdoor courtvard behind it. A corridor of West Ham United FC memorabilia reflects the location around the corner from the team's former Bolevn stadium, since demolished and redeveloped. Some decent beers too: four cask including guests from suppliers like Moor and Twickenham and locals like Howling Hops, Pillars and Pretty Decent among the kegs. Three-star heritage rating. 03/22

Brick Lane Brews (London City Airport). Rebranded **Big Penny Brews** following changes at the owning company, with house beers also rebranded: see the update for Truman's under East London: Hackney. *12/22*

East Side Brewery. Although the brewery briefly added a taproom earlier this year, it struggled with rising costs, and closed in early October. *12/22*

Husk Brewing. Brewing was suspended early in 2023 due to a glitch with a planned move, but should restart by August at The Factory Project, Factory Road E16 2HB using a 10 hl kit formerly at Three Sods. This site is closed to the public, but a new off-site taproom opened in July at 1A Brunel Street Works, 5 Silvertown Way E16 1EA, a more accessible location in a new development by Canning Town station, not far from the Lock-down Room (see Tower Hamlets). *08/23*

Founded by Marinos Alexandrou of the 56 Isle brewery on the Greek island of Paros with the help of former Camden Town and Meantime brewer Matt Dean, this unashamedly contemporary operation is well located at Hawley Wharf, a recently redeveloped area of Camden which effectively extends the popular market across the High Street, bringing much passing trade and supporting longer-than-usual opening hours. It occupies a cluster of railway arches at a triangular junction where the North London Line connects to the West Coast Main Line, with a smart, clean contemporary taproom fronting onto the Regents Canal between two of the three locks from which it takes its name. The 20 hl brewhouse is visible through a picture window behind it, and an adjoining arch round the corner is used as an events space and overspill on busy days. Most beer is dispensed from integrally cooled, polythene-lined lager-style horizontal tanks: the lack of a cold room means cask is unlikely. They're already looking to expand their fermentation capacity. There's no food, but with 30 food traders in the surrounding space you won't go hungry. Other adjacent attractions include an arthouse cinema and an underground alien-themed play park. 08/23

BEERS in tank, keg and can include a regular Lager (4.7%) which currently accounts for 75% of production. Most other beers rotate through contemporary-slanted styles including pale ale, porter and various kettle sours.

A staff member once explained to me why this celebrated gastropub at the southeast corner of Hampstead Heath decided to evolve its beer range: "We're proud of the care we put into our food and wine, and we realised our beer simply wasn't standing up." In truth there's a little way to go to match the impressive fine wine list, but it's great to see a well-chosen range sourced entirely from independents, including an exlusive keg house pale from Five Points. There's always a traditional cask bitter and a more unusual cask choice. perhaps from Redemption or Thornbridge, kegs that might be from 40FT, Bohem or Duration and some jewels among the bottles like Five Points Old Greg barley wine in sharers. You're welcome to call in for a pint, with bar stools kept unreserved, but top flight food is the main focus, with dishes like classic steaks, stuffed courgette flowers, confit chicken rilette, gourmet Scotch eggs and fine cheese, changing to reflect seasonal availability. It's an airy, woody space with plenty of natural light through Venetian blinds and a veritable herd of stuffed bull's heads glaring from the walls. It had a full listing in the second edition, but I didn't manage to revisit for the latest book due to a prolonged closure for refurbishmen in 2019 and the subsequent lockdowns. I'm pleased to renew our acquaintance. Reservation recommended. 08/22

TfL Hampstead Heath Cy Wk Hampstead Heath paths

Upgraded from Try also. London almost lost this charming and perfectly proportioned former Charrington one-star heritage pub almost opposite Hampstead Heath station: it was closed in 2014 for redevelopment but a local campaign resulted in its listing as an Asset of Community Value, preserving the ground floor as a pub. A reopening in June 2015 proved a false dawn lasting a mere seven months but it reopened in May 2021 in the capable hands of the Big Smoke team. The beer range exceeds their usual standard, particularly welcome in a curiously underperforming part of London: aside from the Big Smoke cans, most beer is from guests, with a varied selection of casks from breweries like Arbor, Bristol, Burnt Mill, Five Points, Hammerton and Fyne, kegs from Kernel. Lost and Grounded and Pressure Drop among others, a few bottled Belgians and Germans and several low alcohol and gluten-free options. One bar is informal drinking space; the other is largely set out for diners. This is Hampstead so you won't be surprised to see Fowey mussels and tempura crab on the menu, alongside schnitzels, burgers, aubergine parmigiana and roast squash and pear salad, but prices aren't astronomical. The pub's only flaw is its limited outdoor space, but then Parliament Hill is only a short walk away. 03/22

Visitor note. Ruth Ellis, the last woman hanged in the UK, shot her lover outside the pub in 1955. Local legend holds the plaster damage on the outside wall was caused by bullet holes, but this is likely spurious. Look out for wood panelling, stained glass, a pink marble fireplace and an art deco frieze that date from a 1930s refit. The name refers to a place now known as Amba Mariam in Ethiopia where the British army won a battle in 1868.

TRY ALSO

Colonel Fawcett 1 Randolph Street NW1 0SS **thecolonelfawcett.co.uk**. Big, friendly backstreet pub relaunched in 2011 with fashionably distressed interior and verdant outdoor areas both sides. 13 keg and up to three cask mainly from independents (for example Cloudwater, Fyne, Hammerton, Kernel, Two Tribes) though some through Heineken, plus lots of gin. Formerly the Camden Arms, it now bears the name of the victim of one of the last fatal duels in England, which happened here in 1873. Cash-free. *03/22*

Dartmouth Arms 35 York Rise NW5 1SP **disappearingdiningclub.co.uk/dartmoutharms**. This backstreet pub in the Dartmouth Park area of Tufnell Park has had mixed fortunes, but seems to have done well since 2018 in the hands of former catering popup the Disappearing Dining Club. Only one cask, often from By the Horns, but some others of interest including keg Lost & Grounded, Orbit and Two Tribes and a couple of bottled Belgian classics. A friendly, pleasant little place with an imaginative menu and a penchant for retro vinyl and hi-fi. Simon the Tanner (Central: Borough) became a sister pub in April 2023. Cash-free. *08/23*

Haverstock Tavern 94 Haverstock Hill NW3 2BD **thehaverstocktavern.co.uk**. After several changes of name and ownership, this roadside

pub just up the hill from the Roundhouse seems to have found stability since reopening in 2019 as the first London site of the Northern Union group, originally linked to Leeds Brewery (which has since closed with the brands transferred to Kirkstall). It's a lively, friendly local with a few good beers: three casks with quests that might be from Harvey's, Redemption or Thornbridge, and names like Deva, Mondo, Northern Monk and Two Tribes among a dozen keg options. The group has since rescued two other long-closed pubs in Camden borough, both even more attractive overall though with a little less beer interest: the smart and airy Albert near Primrose Hill (11 Princess Road NW1 8JR) and the villagey Old White Bear (1 Well Road NW3 1LJ) which despite its swanky Hampstead location was shuttered for six years until December 2021. Two outlets in Highgate, the Crown and the Winchester, not yet visited, opened more recently. 08/23

Wolfpack West Hampstead 291 West End Lane NW6 1RD **wolfpacklager.shop**. Similar in style to Wolfpack's other venues (see West: Hammersmith and Fulham) though more of a bar, with an inviting front terrace. No cask, but 10+ kegs including Wolfpack and guests that might come from Gipsy Hill, Northern Monk, Halve Maan in Bruges or KCBC in NYC. Cash-free. *08/23*

HERITAGE PUB

Black Lion 274 Kilburn High Road NW6 2BY blacklionkilburn.co.uk. This large and gobsmackingly magnificent corner pub on the Camden side of Kilburn High Road, backing onto Kilburn Grange Park, was reopened in spring 2022 by London Village Inns, the group behind Brixton's Crown and Anchor (p259) and several other sites. The elaborately decorated interior of the Grade II*-listed 1898 building features copper panels depicting fanciful 18th century scenes, a back bar surmounted by carved friezes, a plasterwork ceiling and some surviving etched glass and wooden screens, including one marking off the music room, now a restaurant serving Indian-style street food. Look out too for the black lions on the red brick and pink marble exterior. Beer options merit a Try also: three cask, often from Five Points and London Brewing, nine keg from the likes of Boon, Brick and Wiper & True. B&B rooms upstairs will follow shortly. Three-star heritage rating. 08/23

UPDATES AND CORRECTIONS

Bohemia House. Following the link with Bohem this charming place has become even more beerfriendly: currently there are six keg lines, including up to three Bohem plus Pilsner Urquell and Radegast. The ice hockey heroes have been replaced by tasteful prints and a book collection, while the menu has been streamlined but remains authentically Czech and Slovak. 08/23

Caps and Taps. This excellent bottle shop-bar moved north to Tufnell Park in November 2021: though still in a shop unit, there's more room for drinking in at tables and benches among the pot plants and fridges. The keg lines have expanded but growlers are discontinued. The can and bottle selection remains extensive, with a rich seam of lambics and wild and mixed fermentation beers in big bottles and some aged beers: ask about the special stuff that isn't on the shelves. *08/23*

Oxford Tavern. West Berkshire changed ownership early in 2022 and withdrew its involvement. The pub continued as a free house but closed in November. It reopened as a more food-focused pub called the **Parakeet** in March 2023 and the beer selection is no longer of interest. *08/23*

St Mary's Brewery. I finally caught up with current brewer Roddy Monroe earlier this year and tasted some of the beers from one of London's more elusive producers, but then heard that brewing was suspended for the foreseeable future in early July 2022 due to refurbishment work on the church. Hopefully it will eventually resume and their tasty **Holy Smoke Porter** (6%) will once again be available. *08/22*

Werewolf Beer. Following several delays, the taproom opened for a test run at Hallowe'en 2021, brewing commenced at the end of February 2022 and full service began on 1 April. The arch, at the dead end of an alley off Randolph Street with a gravelly yard outside, is a simple taproom setup but packed with characterful paraphernalia, notably around 30 pieces from the Nightmare ghost train ride formerly at Rainbow Park, Hunstanton, including several cars. Seasonal events nod to brewer Rich's US origins, marking occasions like July 4, Hallowe'en and Thanksgiving as well as Bruce Springsteen's birthday - the Boss's childhood home, coincidentally, was at 87 Randolph Street, though in Freehold NJ. The 8 hl brewhouse was formerly at the Prince (p191). Currently there are four keg lines, all dedicated to house beers, with plans to extend to 10 and perhaps include a few guests 3. At least 10 canned beers, likely to include rare US imports (DC Brau

and TailGate when I called). Food currently BYO but a partnership with a local pizza and hot dog purveyor is planned.

BEERS are currently keg only but a canning line is imminent. Don't expect front-loaded hop-heavy hazy pales: these are balanced, drinkable beers often with a decent hit of bitterness in a more oldschool US craft style, appropriately for a brewer who grew up in Utica NY, home of FX Matt. Well worth trying are rye IPA **Horrowshow*** (6.1%); **Moonstomp** (4.5%), a US rice lager ("like Budweiser only good"); and **Psychobilly** APA (4.5%). Other regulars, not tasted, are brown ale **Creepster** (5.1%) and **Stray Cat** session pale with added citrus peel (3.4%).

This landmark pub, built for Watney in 1886, was once cut off by the traffic of the busy Archway junction but since 2019 has towered over a muchimproved pedestrianised piazza. The main bar is agreeably clean and woody, used as a shared working space during the day, with a rather larger and still evolving functions and events space at the rear. Since 2020 it's been operated by the team behind online radio station Islington Radio, and two beers brewed for them by Gorgeous feature in a range that is relatively limited but gains points by being sourced largely locally: you may also see Bohem, Hammerton, Signature, Two Tribes and others in a range of styles. 03/22

This pleasant neighbourhood bar with a bottle shop sideline has been filling the gap left by the derelict pub next door since 2016. The narrow interior is more a wine bar in style, with brightly coloured tables and chairs and a tempting sofa, and natural and skin-contact wine is clearly the main interest, with an unusual by-the-glass selection and corkage on bottles to drink in, but beer is certainly not forgotten. Villages and the very small Mackintosh crop up on keg, while bottles and cans encompass lots of Deva, plus Newbarns, Pressure Drop, a few unusual mixed fermentation options and some sturdy Germans. Any pretentiousness is leavened by the collection of Arsenal FC memorabilia on the walls, understandably as it's opposite the main entrance to the Emirates Stadium and tends to adopt a guite different vibe on match days. Expansion of the takeaway side is planned in a refurbished cellar space. 03/22

Visitor note. No, this isn't a former library. It borrows the nickname for Arsenal's now largely demolished former ground at Highbury, which refers in turn to fans' supposed reputation for unusual quietness during matches.

Less is more. The bar counter in this charming little place in a secluded vard off Stoke Newington High Street, by Abney Park Cemetery, currently sports only one handpump and one keg tap. The former dispenses Best Bitter, for several years the only beer Charlie Macintosh made after first turning commercial in 2019. The latter is for the recently added keg conditioned Pale Ale. It's one of the narrowest choices featured here, but both are immaculate and very well kept, and this oneroomed bar, reminiscent of a micropub with its traditional pub furniture and old signs, is the perfect spot to drink them. Originally working on a 2.5 hl kit in a domestic garage (p302), since the start of July 2023 Charlie has cuckoo brewed at Orbit and conditioned and warehoused the beers in the space next to the taproom. The site is slated for redevelopment, but not for some years yet. 08/23

BEERS made to simple recipes with Maris Otter malt and English hops and naturally conditioned are cask **Best Bitter*** (4.6%) and keg **Pale Ale*** (4.6%), both also available in bottle. The cautious expansion of the range is likely to continue with a porter later in the 2023.

TRY ALSO

Landseer Arms 37 Landseer Road N19 4JU landseerarms.com. This impressively large and handsome independent pub on a side street off Holloway Road is noted for its changing Mediterranean menu, but also stocks 3-4 well kept cask and four or more kegs from very local suppliers like Goodness, Hammerton and Muswell Hillbillies. The side bar boasts a handsome skylight with decorated surrounds. *08/23*

UPDATES AND CORRECTIONS

Brave Sir Robin. Closed February 2023. 05/23

BrewDog Dalston (Try also) was one of three London BrewDog outlets closed in September 2022 due to rising energy costs. *12/22*

Duke of York (Try also). One of numerous venues sold by Barworks to Urban Pubs in 2021 with beer range since reduced: see Exmouth Arms under Clerkenwell and Farringdon. *08/22*

Mother Kelly's N16 (Try also) closed in September 2022. 12/22

Two Tribes Brewing (Campfire). I finally got a chance to sample the current taproom setup, a container bar and sheltered outdoor space with benches and tables across from the brewery site. It's quite a funky and jolly setting in which to enjoy a range which now focuses almost entirely on a wide range of own brews. Food from the firepit kitchen might include smoked pork belly or miso mushroom charcoal buns. 08/23

Palm 197 Phillip Lane N15 4HQ **thepalmpub.co.uk**. Substantial 1920s Truman pub redeveloped with stylish but relaxed single bar on ground floor. 10+ keg likely to include Beavertown and other locals, plus up to two cask at weekends only, often One Mile End. Mo closed, cash-free. *03/22*

UPDATES AND CORRECTIONS

Beavertown Brewery. In September 2022, Heineken bought the remaining 51% of Beavertown it didn't already own, so the brewery is now an outright subsidiary of the Dutch multinational. Logan Plant has stepped down as chief executive but is continuing as an "adviser". *12/22*

I've now visited Beavertown's latest outlet, the Corner Pin, which beneath the pastel corporate colours, the skull wallpaper and the fun bespoke bar mounts, retains the appearance of the old pub it is, with half-panelling lining the walls of the single ground floor. A spacious and comfortable beer garden at the back is decorated with murals in the house style, while there's a dining area upstairs and a private hire space above that. There's more outdoor seating on the street, looking directly across to the recently rebuilt Tottenham Hotspur stadium. Friendly staff pour a comprehensive range of beers exclusively from the brewery, with core brands and a few specials and seasonals on keg, some rarer options among the cans (good to see Black Betty and Smog Rocket) and a small handful of Tempus Project bottles, though for some reason these are kept in the cellar with no public evidence of their existence, so you have to ask for them. The single handpump is rarely used: "Our customers usually aren't looking for cask," a staff member told me. Fried pickles, stout-battered fish and chips, vegan beetroot and katsu chicken burgers are on the menu, though with no matching suggestions. It's clearly all designed to make Beavertown products popular and accessible to a

wider audience, which is no bad thing, and credit too for rescuing a pub disused between 2010 and its reopening in late August 2021. But the geekier among us may miss the old days of unearthing unexpected treasures at the Tottenham Hale taproom. *08/22*

Speaking of which, the **taproom** was finally restored in February 2022, now with more space at the Tempus Project site across the road, including a partially sheltered outside yard with lots of beer garden tables. You can drink among the barrel ageing collection indoors, although curiously the beers that emerge from them seem no longer on sale, with cask and keg mainly limited to commonly available Beavertown brands. *08/23*

Carboys, previously included in the August 2022 update, closed in spring 2023. *08/23*

Earth Ale. The brewery had to give up its Wood Green site in November due to redevelopment

and moved out of London to a vineyard near Abingdon, Oxfordshire. Sadly, it's also had to give up the Earth Tap bus in Blue House Yard, so London has lost not only one of its more interesting breweries but one of its quirkiest beer venues. 12/21

Greywood Brewery. The lockdowns proved too much of a challenge for this very small brewery and its owner Adam Armstrong has given up his brewing license, with no activity since 2021. He plans to continue homebrewing and may revive the commercial side if conditions improve. *08/23*

One Mile End. Following the sale of its birthplace pub in Whitechapel to McMullen in September 2022, the brewery rebranded as **OMEBEER**. Sadly this didn't last long and the business closed on 11 January 2023, soon after I'd included the rebrand in the last update. *08/23*

NR Enfield Chase Cy C20 Wk New River Path

Upgraded from Try also. Refurbished and reopened as part of the Big Smoke-Punch partnership in June 2021, this handsome pub almost opposite Enfield Chase station and close to Enfield Town Park is now something of a beer beacon in an otherwise unpromising suburban area. Expect to find a good range of styles on draught from Big Smoke and elsewhere, including darker, more traditional and stronger beers: guest casks might be from Arbor, Siren, Thornbridge or Tiny Rebel, and lots more on keg from the likes of Burning Sky, Deva and Verdant. The menu encompasses small plates (mackerel paté, cauliflower bhajis), upmarket pies, ribs, sausage and mash, sourdough pizzas and veggie options like sweet potato and pumpkin curry. The pub preserves its traditional two-bar layout, with separate doors, and the vintage tiled fireplaces and engraved bay windows now look splendid. 03/22

Olde Mitre 58 High Street, Barnet EN5 5SJ greeneking-pubs.co.uk. This lovely Grade IIlisted part-17th century timber-framed coaching inn and one-star heritage pub on the Great North Road has long been on local cask lovers' radar. But I left it out of the last print edition as in July 2021 the longstanding landlord, who had bought out the tie, moved on and it became a Greene King managed house. I'm happy to report that the legacy remains thanks to cellar manager Eleanor. Expect up to nine casks including Taylor Landlord and quests in varied styles from smaller breweries, often Hertfordshire ones like Mad Squirrel and Tring, but London and Kent beers are also spotted among GK standards and seasonals. There are one or two beers of interest among the kegs and bottles too. Recommending managed chain pubs is always hazardous as staff turnover is often high, but this is likely to return to a full entry in a later guide if standards are maintained. 08/23

Black Horse (Barnet Brewery). Oak Taverns gave up the lease in November 2021 and freeholders Heineken closed the in-house brewery, but the pub has since been taken on by small group Masterson Leisure Holdings (MLH) and continues to stock a decent range of cask beer, with six lines including XT IPA and rotating guests from breweries like Adnams and Portobello. Probably now more a Try also. *08/23*

Enefeld. After a period contract brewing for others during 2021, brewing ceased by February 2022 with the equipment up for sale. *03/22*

Urban Alchemy Brewing Co. An offsite taproom opened in central Barnet in July 2022 but this had to close in March 2023, with brewing also suspended due to building work. The brewery hopes to open another taproom later in 2023. *08/23*

It became a full-on beer stop during the lockdowns, reopening in May 2021 with wellstocked shelves and fridges, keg lines, high stools and tables indoors and plenty of space outside. The selection sidesteps very local breweries, preferring quality producers from the wider UK, like Deva, Harbour, Overtone, Vault City and Brew York, a few more distant Londoners like Hammerton and Weird Beard and the occasional Belgian, German or Baltic import. Jerky (dried meat snacks) made in-house includes recipes with beer and vegan versions, and they're also proud of their Boozy Bacon Jam. 03/22

Owner and wine merchant Benno reworked this old off license in the Bermondsev Blue into a rather smarter beer and wine outlet in January 2022, at first not realising it was right on the 'mile'. It's a bright, well-arranged and friendly shop with a bit of seating on high stools and shelves and on the street for drinking in, and there are plans to turn a space at the back into a more expansive drinking zone. You can stock up on several Bermondsey brewers in one place but there are also names from not too far away but off the main drag, like Forest Road and Small Beer, as well as breweries like Cloudwater, Duration, Canopy, Orbit and Two Tribes and a few Belgian and German options. An imaginative tapas menu including stuffed courgette flower, cheeseboards and salads should be added soon. 08/22

Dean Swift 10 Gainsford Street SE1 2NE **thedeanswift.com**. Once a top choice, this rather charming pub on the corner of the old Courage brewery site near Butlers Wharf has recently recovered some of its appeal under the same management as Firefly (Try also p275). Three decent cask on automatic pump dispense plus 12 keg and a few bottles and cans, though a preponderance of pale ales and lagers. Cash-free. *08/22*

Doghouse Tap 87 Enid Street SE16 3EH. This new arch-based bar is connected to close neighbours Bianca Road. Not yet visited. *08/23*

Barrel Project. Still open, but London Beer Factory beers are now made outside London: see Central South London. *12/22*

BBNo. Following its move to its much larger site in Greenwich, BBNo gave up arch 74 in Enid Street, with the main taproom continuing in arch 79. In April 2022 a 1.5 hl pilot kit was installed here brewing specials for the site, including some revivals of old favourites. This was removed in March 2023, and in May the entire arch closed in response to continuing financial pressure: see under Greenwich and Lewisham. *08/23* Fourpure Brewing. Continuing the trend of multinational brewers shedding their 'craft' purchases, Kirin subsidiary Lion Little World announced in February 2022 that, following a review of its investment priorities, it was likely to sell both Fourpure and its other UK brand, Magic Rock in Huddersfield, acquired in 2019. In August, both breweries and the Little Creatures Regents Canal brewpub (Central London: Angel to Bloomsbury) were bought by Odyssey Inns, also known as In Good Company, a new venture led by Stephen Cox, co-founder of the successful Utopian brewery in Devon. All the businesses have continued to trade and the new owner says it's keen to develop the brands further. Brewers John Driebergen and Ollie Parker had already left to set up Great Beyond (Central: Shoreditch and Hoxton above). Big Drop beer is also brewed at Fourpure: see Brewers without breweries. 08/23

Mash Paddle Brewery. Following various delays, the project secured a site in Bermondsey early in 2022 at 92 Enid Street SE16 4AW, a few arches southeast of Craft Beer Junction and close to BBNo, Bianca Road and the Kernel. 'Soft opening' began in June, initially only with a bar stocking other people's beer, but a few small-scale trial brews began to appear soon afterwards. Full brewing facilities have been in place since autumn 2022 with at least two own brands regularly on sale in keg plus numerous guests, with regular beginner classes so you can brew (and can) your own beer in 20 I batches. A more detailed writeup will follow in a future update. *05/23*

Partizan Brewing. Perhaps the most significant post-lockdown loss, this excellent and significant brewery closed its taproom at short notice in March 2023 and relocated operations outside the capital. Partizan was the second modern Bermondsey brewery when it opened in 2012, but evewatering rent increases for its railway arch, coupled with a post-lockdown decline in taproom trade, decided the issue. Coupled with Anspach & Hobday and BBNo relocating production elsewhere, this reduces the Bermondsey brewery total to seven, undoubtedly reflecting the more aggressive approach of new landlords the Arch Co. Meanwhile Partizan's assets have been sold to Langton Brewing in Market Harborough where Andy will continue to brew the brands, so at least they won't disappear completely. 05/23

Secret Goldmine Yeastie Boys Taproom (Try also). The café closed in May 2023 and with it the popup taproom. *08/23*

Small Beer. The taproom is once again open on a regular basis and even boasts a cask line, as well as four keg and 5+ bottles, with regular quizzes and live music. *12/22*

Spartan Brewery closed on 17 June 2023 with the lease and kit sold to a new owner. Brewing is currently suspended, though may well resume and the taproom reopen during 2023 under a new name. Three Hills. The kit was moved to the company's other site in Northamptonshire in spring 2023 and all production is now centred there. The Bermondsey arch remains open as a bar, with a little barrel ageing in progress. 08/23

Section boundaries. I should have noticed that Kennington station was moved in 2021 from Zone 2 to the Zone 1-2 boundary. Venues close to it, therefore, more correctly belong in Central: Borough and Southbank than here. This affects only Oaka in the book, though I've since listed neighbour the Old Red Lion as a Try also. Tap In, listed as a Try also and since renamed Feed the Yak, has also been moved to Borough and Southbank as it's so close to Elephant & Castle. *08/23*

Affinity Brewing Co Shop was closed during summer 2023. 08/23

Beer Shop London. Sadly, this marvellous venue closed in December 2022 when the landlord chose not to renew the lease, planning instead to redevelop the building. *12/22*

Brick Tap Room. Still open, but see Brick Brewery under Greenwich and Lewisham below. 08/23

Bullfinch Brewery / Bull and Finch. Commissioning the brewery at the Bull and Finch took longer than expected, but it was in action by February 2022 and the beers were on sale by April. Brewer and manager Jon Griffiths divides 150 I batches of wort between several fermenters with different yeasts, mixed cultures and dry hops to create limited edition sour, mixed fermentation and kveik beers for sale in the pub under the **So** What name. Revivals of Bullfinch cask beers under the name **Bull and Finch** will follow, while the bar has expanded its range of Belgian and German imports. Brewing continues at the Herne Hill site on a small scale, with core brands currently cuckoo brewed. 08/22

Canopy Beer Co. This distinctive and well-loved brewerv announced its closure in November 2022. "The current economic situation makes our position untenable." said founders Estelle and Matt Theobalds in a statement. "We are choosing to close in order that we have control over the process...We have tried, without being afraid of failing." The site and much of the equipment has since been acquired by Bird House London, a small bar group led by Frazer Timmerman (ex-London Fields and Truman's) and William Fuller which operates three venues including Peckham Arches and the Hawks Nest in Shepherds Bush. The initial plan is to brew mainly for the company's own outlets, possibly including some cask beer, and to refurbish and reopen the taproom. The name is yet to be confirmed they're hoping to start brewing in May 2023. 05/23

Dulwich Beer Dispensary (Try also). Despite being upgraded to a full listing in a previous update, this site was closed in May 2023. *08/23*

Kanpai is relocating both brewery and taproom from Peckham to an arch in the Bermondsey beer 'mile' following the Peckham Festival on 17 September 2023. See under Bermondsey. *08/23*

London Beer Factory. The Warehouse Taproom proved short-lived and was closed in October 2021. In summer 2022 the brewery gave up its site and relocated brewing outside London to Norfolk, though the Barrel Project in Bermondsey continues as a brewery outlet. *12/22*

Lowline Tap (Better World). Reviewed in a previous update but closed on 26 May 2023 due to economic pressures. Brewing continues for the moment: see Brewers without breweries. *08/23*

Pigeon. Anspach & Hobday's Camberwell bar closed in August 2022. *12/22*

Tap In (Try also) has rebranded as **Feed the Yak** but retains a good beer offer, so I've upgraded it to a main entry, now moved to Central: Borough and Southbank given its proximity to Elephant & Castle station. *08/23*

Longstanding cuckoo brewers Common Rioters' long-awaited conversion of a former bank overlooking the little patch of green at the Blackheath Standard finally opened in July 2022, although on-site brewing in a small room visible from the main bar is unlikely to follow until 2023. But it's already a delight, a cheerfully bright space lit by picture windows and finished in pale green and natural wood, with keg taps sprouting from a tiled back bar. Top marks for showing the beer styles first, written above the taps, and for an adventurous range, including wheat beers, stouts and good lagers as well as pales and IPAs. Currently beers are sourced from the likes of Brick. Burnt Mill. Duration. Kernel and Meraki: quests will continue once brewing has commenced, with a 50:50 split. There's some gems in the fridges too, like rarities from Campervan and Track, and 3 Fonteinen lambic. Plans include converting the bank vault below into a tasting room. 08/22

Upgraded from Try also. This longstanding cask champion, along a pedestrianised street just off Eltham High Street, has been entirely independently owned since 2021 and the range has widened further. Old favourites like Adnams and Harvey's regularly recur alongside guests from breweries like Iron Pier, Oakham, Otter, Rudgate or Titanic, and I even spotted a dark old ale in midsummer. Hofmeister and a couple of bigger 'craft' brands are on keg, alongside occasional Belgian bottles and a stock of Young's Light Ale for some regulars to mix with their bitter. Lunchtime food stretches to Malaysian curry, pork belly and pie and mash. It's an immaculately pretty place that preserves its external Truman's branding and tiling, while the indoor décor (decorative ceramics and pot plants) and civilised atmosphere create a pleasing cross between a pub and a slightly chintzy tea room. *08/23*

Visitor note. Nearby Eltham Palace, now open to the public, was the childhood home of Henry VIII, but was lavishly rebuilt by the Cortauld family in the 1930s as one of the most important art deco buildings in England.

London regained one of its larger craft brewers in December 2021 when new owner SALT Beer Factory reinstated production at the former Hop Stuff brewery in Thamesmead. By early December the old Hop Stuff bars in Deptford and Woolwich had already been rebranded and test brewing and flavour matching were in process, with commercial production resuming a few months later. Hop Stuff originally opened in 2013 in a unit at the Royal Arsenal, Woolwich. After a dramatic expansion to the current site, on former Arsenal land near Belmarsh Prison, in 2018, it ran into difficulties and was bought by Coors in a prepack administration deal in 2019. Brewing restarted in December that year, but after around 25 brews, the 2020 lockdown struck, so the facility was mothballed and later put up for sale (see p325 for more background).

SALT is a contemporary craft-slanted offshoot of Ossett Brewery, which began on a very small scale in 1998 in the West Yorkshire town of the same name and expanded substantially in June 2005. The original SALT Beer Factory opened in 2018 as a brewpub in one of the historic buildings on the World Heritage Site at Saltaire near Bradford, and quickly established a good reputation. The brewery had long planned to expand its London business and with capacity running short at home, the Hop Stuff facility, with its automated five-vessel 70 hl brewhouse and plenty of space for expansion, was a good fit. The new owners have already commissioned the steam heating plant, installed but never used under previous regimes, and are introducing further improvements.

SALT haven't made many changes to the two bars, which are well-liked locally for pizzas as well as beer: they're made to order in red, white and green variants, with plenty of vegan and veggie options among the toppings and weekly changing specials with seasonal ingredients. The beer range now includes a good choice of SALT beers alongside guests from local and other UK independents in a range of styles: on recent visits I spotted Exale, Hammerton, Lost & Grounded, Siren and Villages among others. The Woolwich venue also has cask from Ossett, to enjoy in a pleasant downstairs space with high tables and woody finishes or in a more expansive upstairs mezzanine, with intriguing lines of empty bottles and cans visible from the stairs. It's just round the corner from the new Elizabeth Line station and handy for other attractions on the Royal Arsenal site. Its Deptford sister, with similar décor in recycled wood, has more of a restaurant feel, a wider choice of SALT specials and collabs in can and no cask, though this might be added. It's close to Hop Burns and Black's Deptford branch and the Villages brewery. A taproom might eventually be added at the brewery itself, though may only open for special events. 08/22

BEERS from the London site are currently keg only, though the canning line should be recommissioned later in 2022, and there are plans for cask. SALT are using the extra capacity to brew their most popular core brands, **Jute** session IPA (4.2%) and **Huckabuck** NEIPA (5.5%), while continuing smaller runs and specials in Saltaire. The Hop Stuff brand wasn't part of the deal: Coors has retained it so may brew the recipes elsewhere. *Visitor note*. Both taprooms are in handsome heritage settings. The Royal Arsenal was developed from the 1650s on a site adjacent to a Tudor-era naval dockyard: at its peak during World War I it occupied 520 ha and employed 80,000 people, but was closed in 1994 and subsequently redeveloped. Deptford station, opened in 1836, is now the oldest operational rail station in London, noted for its rare 1856 carraige ramp, restored as part of a new public space in 2016.

Opposite Goldsmith's College on the busy New Cross gyratory, it manages a charming combination of homely, retro-funky and beer hall decor, set off by the rocking chair and 60s ashtray stand on the tiny terrace. The owners are big on well-kept cask, with a house bitter from Anspach & Hobday and quests from the likes of Elusive. Elsewhere there's a range of styles from ultra-locals like Brick, Orbit and Villages, including dark and sour options. Even the wide range of packet snacks is artfully chosen. 08/22

Refurbed as a gastroish but friendly local in late 2019, this strikingly handsome, biggish residential corner pub on the edge of Blackheath, Deptford and Greenwich has a praiseworthy penchant for very local suppliers: two casks, usually from Brick and By the Horns, with more Brick among five kegs alongside Brockley and Villages. 08/23

UPDATES AND CORRECTIONS

BBNo (Brew by Numbers). BBNo's new site opened as planned in September 2021. The brewery continued production in Bermondsey for a while (see above) but in May 2023 finally closed the last of its two arches there to centre activities in Greenwich. In response to rumours that it was in deep financial trouble, it announced that it was about to finalise a restructuring deal securing significant new investment while keeping the company independent. It entered administration in June, though as a going concern, with both taproom and brewery continuing to operate. The Breal Group, which now owns Brick (see below) as well as Black Sheep in North Yorkshire, is known to be interested but so far no new owner has been confirmed. *08/23*

A rectangle of handsome Victorian warehouse has been turned into an atmospheric bar right next to the spacious production facilities, with 'numbers' banners hanging from the high ceiling. The 'Greenwich beach' part of the address may sound overly hopeful, but this stretch of riverside really does have sandy beaches at low tide. Only eight taps were in action when I called, mixing guests from the likes of Rock Leopard with BBNo beers dispensed direct from an array of six steel tanks behind the bar, plus a good selection of cans. Food is a pizza concession in a container on the terrace. If arriving by boat, best alight at Greenwich Pier rather than North Greenwich, as it's then a straightforward 25-minute walk along the Thames Path. Brewery tours available. 07/22

Brick Brewery. In the face of rising rents and energy costs, the cost-of-living crisis and other challenges, the company went into administration on 2 June 2023. Its brands and assets were subsequently bought out by investment company the BREAL group, which a few weeks previously had acquired the equally troubled (and rather older established) Black Sheep brewery in Masham, North Yorkshire. For the moment, production continues as normal under the leadership of founders lan and Sally Stewart: long may it remain so. *08/23*

Brockley Brewery. Taproom hours have changed and are as below. *08/23*

Forest Road Brewing. Onsite brewing did indeed commence in September, with the canning line commissioned in November. The beer has even been sighted in cask occasionally. *12/21*

Ignition Brewery. The brewery is one of four participating in the Local Brewery Loop initiative: see under Outer Southeast London below. In March 2023, founder Nick O'Shea announced he was planning to move on, and the brewery is currently seeking expressions of interest in taking over its management and ownership. *05/23*

Jars Bar Notified as a possible Try also in August 2022 but since closed. *05/23*

Meantime Brewing. Asahi announced in early December 2022 that it was closing the Dark Star brewery at Partridge Green, West Sussex, which it acquired with its purchase of Fuller's in 2018. It subsequently named Meantime, another of its breweries, as the new home of the Dark Star brands, though the flagship cask beer, Hophead, had long been brewed at Fuller's in Chiswick and two other cask beers. American Pale Ale and Revelation, are currently produced there too. But Meantime has been equipped to brew and package cask beer for what's almost certainly the first time in its history, and all Dark Star beers should move there by the end of 2023, except Hophead which will remain at Fuller's. Dark Star has London roots: it was co-founded in 1994 in the cellar of the Evening Star pub in Brighton by Rob Jones. who began his brewing career by co-founding a pioneering London microbrewery, Pitfield, in Hoxton in 1981. The Sussex brewery took its name from one of Pitfield's beers, a porter named Dark Star, the first microbrewed beer to win Champion Beer of Britain in 1987 (for more see desdemoor.co.uk/pitfield-brewery). With the US-accented Hophead, Dark Star itself became a major influence on the development of the UK craft brewing scene. 08/23

Old Kent Road Brewery. The brewery ceased operations in January 2022 with a farewell party at Beer Shop London. *01/22*

Plum Tree. There are no longer plans to add a brewery, though the venue continues to sell a great range of other people's beer. *12/21*

Royal Albert. Since Portobello took over, the range has dwindled slightly, with only a small handful of largely low/no alcohol cans and bottles, but this is still noteworthy for the quality and interest of its four casks (plus two ciders) and 10+ kegs, from Portobello and high calibre independents including locals: Partizan, Signature, Two Tribes and Wild were all recently spotted. Note shortened hours: \bigcirc *Mo-Th* 16.00-23.00, *Fr-Sa* 12.00-01.00, *Su* 12.00-24.00. *08/23*

Up the Creek. The bar is currently only open to ticket holders for events. The brewery is also now offering one-day brewing courses. *08/23*

Villages Brewery. Founders Archie and Louis Village moved on in July 2022 in the interests of "a change of pace, lifestyle, and some new experiences". They sold the business as a going concern to new directors Simon Baldwin and Malcolm Elliot, who are also involved in two breweries outside London: Backyard in Walsall and Grasshopper in Nottingham. It seems activities will continue largely as normal for the moment. *12/22*

Volden Brewing. Though some of the brewing kit is in place at the new site, it's not yet been commissioned, with further delays including for the installation of utilities. Brewing is now scheduled for 2023; meanwhile brands continue to be cuckoo brewed at Portobello and Wimbledon. *12/22*

Wrong Side of the Tracks. Brewing was suspended by the end of 2021 but the brands made a comeback in October 2022, now cuckoo brewed at Dogs Grandad. It's hoped production on site will ultimately be revived too. *12/22*

This little community-minded craft beer and cocktail bar round the corner from Hayes station provides a contemporary complement to the more traditionally styled, and also recommended, Real Ale Way micropub nearby (p250). Cheerful owner Lou, who resurrected it in July 2021 after the previous owner gave up during the lockdowns, focuses on a variety of pale ales and lagers with darker options kept for the cooler months, regularly featuring Londoners like Belleville, Brixton, Signature and Southwark alongside the likes of New Bristol, Northdown or Tiny Rebel. There's a 'pizza and beer' deal with a neighbouring pizzeria, including some unusual options. A bright, clean space at the front boasts steel café tables and bar stools, and there's a sought-after booth at the back. Activities include mocktail mixing sessions for kids, which sounds great fun. 08/23

Coffee bar by morning, craft beer and wine bar later in the day and informal art gallery throughout, this pleasantly and creatively decorated shopfront site has shades of a micropub, though the owner, garrulous ex-bookie Giles, insists it's a bar. Whatever, since October 2022 it's done a good job of serving the residents of 'highly desirable' and mildly arty Chatterton Village, off Bromley Common, and beer lovers from further afield. Dark Star Hophead is permanent on cask; others, in a range of styles, may be from locals like Anspach & Hobday, Bexley or Iron Pier, or drawn more widely from breweries like Beer York, Marble, Oakham or Thornbridge. Kegs, cans and bottles widen the repertoire to Beak, Signature, Yonder and a few Belgian classics. They're also proud of the homemade cupcakes. 08/23

Visitor note. The unusual name is from a now-vanished local pub and may have been a reference to the use of Bromley Common as a duelling ground. The distinctive David Bowie mural commemorates the musician's local links.

Brewing Co and Park. There's usually a dark option and a stronger and more experimental brew, and a beer fridge should shortly widen the choice. A mix of high and low seating on smartly varnished tables looks out on a reasonably sized outdoor space under a canopy at the front. *03/22*

This worthy offshoot of the original Real Ale Way in Hayes (p250) occupies a distinctive corner building, formerly an upholsterer, in West Wickham town centre opposite Sainsbury's (a little way from the station despite the address). Big windows allow plenty of light into a clean, bright and reasonably sized space equipped with both high and low seating and its own bar, though cask beer in top condition is fetched from stillages in a cold room in classic micropub style by friendly staff. The focus is on Kent and southeast London brewers, like Bexley, Larkins, Mad Cat, Nelson and Tonbridge, the last of whom supplies the house pale, and there's nearly always a darker option. A third branch has opened just outside London in Westerham, and a fourth is planned near Bromley South station during 2022. 03/22

The beer range may be limited and leaning on the traditional bitter side – regulars like Adnams, Bexleyheath BOB and Harvey's, with guests from these breweries and others like Canterbury Ales and Westerham, plus decent Hofmeister lager – but this classic traditional pub in a cottagey 1850s building incongruously set among Bexleyheath suburbia is a multiple local CAMRA award winner for its well-maintained cask and friendly welcome. Three distinct spaces surround a central bar with traditional banquettes and tables, with the award and tankard collection off left. The leafy rear garden is scattered with statuary, complementing an unexpected Italian flavour to the lunchtime food. A former Courage pub, it's been in the same family management since 1980 and is now entirely independent. 08/23

LOCAL BREWERY LOOP

Four small breweries on the boundaries of Bromley and Lewisham are collaborating on this simple but ingenious promotional initiative, built around a three-mile (5 km) walking route linking them all, with a loyalty card and a badge for participants who buy a drink in all four. The breweries are Br3wery (p244), Ignition (p232), Southey (p251) and Three Hounds (p252): for more, ask in the participating venues or visit **localbreweryloop.co.uk**. 03/22

UPDATES AND CORRECTIONS

Anspach and Hobday. Though the taproom at the main site originally opened every Saturday, this proved hard to sustain in the winter. It's currently open for special events only, though these tend to take place at least monthly. Regular opening may be restored over the summer. The brewery has launched a new and very tasty nitro stout, **London Black** (4.4%), which it's currently promoting heavily as a London-brewed independent alternative to big commercial brands, and is crowdfunding again to expand production further. 12/21

Bexley Brewery. Hours at the Bird and Barrel have been amended to *Th* 17.00-22.00, *Fr* 16.00-22.00, *Sa* 14.00-22.00, *Su* 14.00-18.00. *12/21*

Bolthole. The beer range here has become even more restricted: two Harvey's casks when I called and a few multinational 'craft' brands. Perhaps no longer a recommendation. *08/23*

Cronx Brewery. The Cronx Bar at Croydon Boxpark closed when the lease expired in late 2020 but a new central Croydon outlet eventually opened in May 2023: see Try Also above. *08/23*

Door Hinge. Under new ownership since 2019, this pioneering little micropub is much as before, retaining its look of a traditional pub in miniature, though now brightened up and with an extra room at the back with a dartboard and books. Still only three casks, but from independent, often London or Kent breweries, and usually including a traditional bitter, a more modern pale and a dark option, plus bag-in-box and bottled ciders. *08/23*

Lock and Barrel (Try also). Closed March 2023. *05/*23

Next Door (Try also). Closed by early 2023. 08/23

Red Lion (Try also). A call in summer 2023 confirmed a relatively restrained bitter-only selection of cask choices, though flawlessly kept. Greene King Abbot and IPA and Harvey's Sussex Best are the regulars; the two guests are likely from bigger breweries or GK seasonals. *08/23*

NR Loughborough Junction

This arch under the Overground was once just the Craft Metropolis warehouse, but someone realised the potential of the site in what's now something of a beery cluster at Loughborough Junction, and in May 2022 it became a bar and shop too. Unsurprisingly, it has a similarly diverse and wellpicked beer selection as the existing Penge venue (p246): keg taps on a back bar dispensing a range of styles from admired London and UK breweries, and numerous fridges with beer to take away or drink in with a corkage charge, helpfully divided into categories like local (Brick, Gravity Well, London Beer Lab, Three Hills), "Best of British" (Elusive, Frontal, Unbarred, Whiplash) and imports (Basqueland, Moersleutel, Nerdbrewing, Tilguin), including some special stuff in big bottles. The difference is it's in the larger, more atmospheric surrounds of a railway arch, with walls partially clad in container-style black corrugated steel. The downstairs space is relatively small but manages an incongruously cosy corner with a standard lamp; there's a more expansive mezzanine equipped with black-painted beer hall tables. Yardsale is the pizza partner. 08/22

The former Taproom by Brixton Village in Brixton Village Market has reopened as a non-brewing outlet for German Kraft, selling beers brewed mainly at its Elephant site. A BrewDog in a mall, opened in January 2023, although don't be misled by Google Maps into searching indoors, as the bar has street access at the corner of Garratt Lane, just opposite the Ram brewery site and Sambrook's. A typically brash space on two floors, with the usual mainly ownbrand offer across 26 keg lines, although a few from former locals By the Horns and a richer seam of bottles and cans than normal, including good lambics, other mixed fermentation brews and aged strong stouts. *08/23*

Clapton Craft 31 St Johns Hill SW11 1TT **claptoncraft.co.uk**. Small but conveniently situated branch, opened December 2021 almost opposite the Brighton Yard (southwest) entrance of Clapham Junction station. Up to six kegs with growler fills, 250+ bottles/cans mainly from London and the UK and one of the biggest selections of wine in the chain. Takeaway only. *03/22*

Masons Arms 169 Battersea Park Road SW8 4BT **masons-arms-battersea.co.uk**. Right by Battersea Park station, this reopened as one of Fuller's 'crafty' pubs in 2019, refurbished in the sort of stripped-back, distressed style more often deployed by certain other pub companies. Three casks include Dark Star brands, while 15 keg taps and 20+ bottles and cans encompass a range of styles from London and other British craft producers: expect BBNo, Brew Toon, Drop Project, Siren and Wiper & True among others, poured by knowledgeable staff. *08/23*

Telegraph Telegraph Road SW15 3TU **brunningandprice.co.uk/telegraph**. Upmarket chain Brunning & Price reopened this substantial Putney Heath landmark in 2020, adding a typically decent selection of up to eight cask lines, with locals like Sambrook's and Twickenham alongside Adnams and XT, plus Two Tribes on keg. Amazingly rustic and secluded given its proximity to busy Tibbets Corner interchange. *08/23*

HERITAGE PUB

Spread Eagle 71 Wandsworth High Street SW18 2PT spreadeaglewandsworth.co.uk. A substantial Grade II-listed three-star heritage pub-hotel built by Young's in 1898 almost opposite what was then its brewery site, this sports a decorative iron and stained glass canopy outside and seemingly acres of sparkling engraved glass within, backing an imposing bar and marking off three separate rooms. The left-hand bar would once have been divided further, but the extensive main bar with skylight was likely always a single space. There's a snug just inside the 'dining room and lounge' if you can snag it. Sympathetically refurbished and reopened in March 2022, it once again has hotel bedrooms upstairs. Standard Young's cask and keg beers but only a few steps from Sambrook's and BrewDog. 08/23

BrewDog Clapham Junction. Closed March 2023. 05/23

By the Horns. In December 2021, the brewery took on the operation of the Phoenix bar, part of the newly redeveloped AFC Wimbledon Cherry Red Records Stadium site across the road though also open to the public. This builds on an existing relationship with a special collab modern pale ale for the stadium, Crazy Gang Pale Ale (4.2%). As reported in the guide, most brewing had already been relocated outside London to Redhill, and as the stadium bar is now effectively the taproom, the old arches, which housed a pilot brewery, have been vacated. This means there's currently no brewing in London. Also known simply as By the Horns @ Plough Lane, the venue has an ultramodern sports bar feel, with concrete floor, exposed piping, neon signs and big screens, but it's friendly and has a comprehensive range of BtH beers plus the occasional unusual quest. A staircase gives access to the stands on match days. It's tricky to find so look out for signs. Follow Copper Mill Lane, which branches off Plough Lane by Topps Tiles, to find the main stadium entrance right with two flights of steps flanking the team shop. Take the path through the open gate just to the left of these and the bar is on the right. 08/22

Ram Inn (SlyBeast Brewing). This was one of the leasehold pubs sold by Young's to Punch and, disappointingly, the new owner decided to take back the lease. In-house brewing ceased in early May 2022, though with a hope the brand may be revived elsewhere. In autumn, cuckoo brewer **Coalition Brewing** (p321) began using the kit on a regular basis, though on the assumption that this was temporary as the equipment was due for removal. In January 2023 the venue was remodelled into a **Laine** pub, now also owned by Punch, and the kit was retained: it may also be used to produce Laine-branded beer. I'm currently attempting to confirm future plans. *05/23*

This ex-Young's two-bar corner pub a few steps from central Teddington was reopened in November 2021 as part of Big Smoke's developing partnership with Punch. Smartly fitted out with leather banquettes, substantial chairs and an eclectic collection of wall decorations, it offers several comfortable corners to enjoy well-kept cask and an informed choice of kegs from the parent brewery and elsewhere. Harvey's Best is near-permanent; BBNo, By the Horns, Deya, Moor, Northern Monk and Siren recur; dark beers and sours feature and there's a regular offer on takeway cans. Besides barbecue ribs and chicken, food choices could include harissa cauliflower steak, sourdough pizzas, various pies and sharing plates, with a discount on weekday lunches. A worthwhile addition to an area that also boasts the Mason's Arms. *03*/22

Another ex-Antic reassigned to Portobello, this town centre venue is worth knowing about in an area otherwise devoid of beery recommendations, with two cask lines, often Portobello or Big Smoke, and around 15 cans, largely from admired Londoners, Cloudwater and the like. Bigger than it looks, it stretches back a long way and preserves now-distressed remnants of pretty tiling. *08/23*

UPDATES AND CORRECTIONS

Albion and **Antelope** (Try also). Potentially affected by the restructuring of Big Smoke pubs: see Chains, pubcos and brewery pubs. *08/23*

CTZN Brew (formerly Kew Brewery). Sadly, the brewery ceased operations by the end of 2021 and its Twickenham taproom (above) is also closed. The owners initially told me they were hoping to resume trading at some point but the company has since gone into liquidation. *08/22*

Drop Project. Following disappointing footfall, the brewery hrgas decided to end regular taproom opening at least for the quieter months, though will continue to open for special events. *01/22*

Jeffersons Brewery. Due to Covid-19 and the energy crisis, the brewery suspended production early in September 2022 "until market conditions improve", but the was then formally dissolved in January 2023. *08/23*

Trafalgar. This classic little backstreet South Wimbledon pub (23 High Path SW19 2JY) was much loved by local beer lovers and a mainstay of previous editions but closed during the lockdowns and didn't reopen due to redevelopment so was feared gone for good. But in a pleasant surprise, former owner Roger Molyneux tells me it's finally due to reopen, perhaps in summer 2023. I'll provide more details as soon as I can. 08/23

Watermans Arms (Try also). Closed unexpectedly in June 2022 following a rent increase. 08/22

Upgraded from Try also. Just on the Mortlake side of Brentford Bridge and right by the lock and the Grand Union Canal, this smallish pub functions as a beer oasis, a community local, a music venue and the taproom for the petite Tiny Vessel brewery (p313 and updated under Outer West London below). Run by brewery founder Ivailo, it stocks his beers in bottle, keg and occasional cask, alongside Oakham Citra and another cask choice, as well as several other beers of interest including Belgian classics (Achouffe, Duchesse de Bourgogne, Orval, Rochefort), Tynt Meadow and draught Budvar. Closed for over a year for refurbishment, it reopened in October 2022 with a bright, clean interior that's a bit more community coffee bar than pub but attractive enough with its Mondrian and Pollock-inspired murals. 08/23

Roundwood Project

Founded by longstanding homebrewer Shem Wallis-Jones, this is a small brewery in a community of creative businesses in Park Royal. 08/22

BEERS (not tasted) are currently largely bottled.

TRY ALSO

Brook 38 New Road, Brentford TW8 0NU **thebrookfreehouse.co.uk**. Formerly the Red Lion, this exceptionally friendly ex-Courage backstreet community pub reopened in its current independent guise in June 2019. One well-kept cask, often from Long Man, and nine interesting kegs (perhaps Jawbone, Mondo or Polly's), in a pretty Brewer's Tudor building given a contemporary but quirky makeover. Closed Mo-Tu. *08/23*

UPDATES AND CORRECTIONS

Black Dog (Fearless Nomad). Brewing was suspended by June 2023, with the brewers currently considering its future. The pub remains fully open, however. *08/23*

BrewDog Ealing. On a recent visit I noted a wider than typical selection of 100+ bottles/cans, with Belgian classics, Londoners and big wild and mixed fermentation bottles from 3 Fonteinen, Funk Factory (US) and others, as well as some BrewDog rarities. Around 25 keg lines are now mainly house beers, as in other branches, though with a local line (Gipsy Hill when I looked) and imports. Knowledgeable staff as always. *08/23*

Ealing Brewing. Following the taproom closure in June 2022 came the news that the brewery was closing entirely in December. In January 2023 the owners announced that they weren't in fact stopping brewing, but by June the Brentford site had been sold and production has reverted to where it started, on the small kit at the Owl and Pussycat brewpub under the original brand name Marko Paulo. *08/23*

Fox (Try also). This classic pub now has a onestar heritage rating and an impressively extended sheltered garden. Five well-kept casks include changing guests that might be from Park or Twickenham, plus Five Points, Gipsy Hill and Pillars among five kegs of note. Built in 1909 for the Royal brewery, Brentford, and likely designed by renowned pub architect T H Nowell Parr, it retains a partly mirrored back bar and counter, fireplace at the rear, bench seating and some signing though has lost its dividing screens. *08/23*

Fuller's Griffin Brewery. Although Meantime is now officially the home of the Dark Star brands (see Southeast: Greenwich and Lewisham), some are still being produced here, and there are no plans to move production of the best-selling Hophead to Greenwich. *08/23*

George and Dragon. Though the brewhouse is still in place, it remains unused, and the beer range is reduced too, with the bottle and can fridge gone. The two cask lines and eight or so kegs that remain are mainly well-known big brands, although the likes of Siren might pop up. No longer a recommendation. *08/23*

Parakeet City Brewing. This very small operation apparently ceased activity early in 2022. *12/22*

Weird Beard. The brewery was put up for sale in February 2022 with all brewing suspended. The

brand has since been bought by Doghouse Brewery in Darwen, Lancashire, and founder Bryan Spooner has moved to join its staff. This at least means Weird Beard's excellent beers will still be around, despite the considerable loss to the London brewing scene. The brewery has long been a very welcome presence in a part of the city where decent beer is relatively sparse, though perhaps this also contributed to the challenges of keeping it going. We wish Bryan the best of luck. 08/22

This brewery in a Hammersmith basement previously passed under my radar due to lockdown disruptions and the softest of soft launches and currently feels like a best-kept secret, but brewer Jo plans to ramp up publicity substantially in autumn 2022. It's easy to miss: look for a picnic bench on the street, step inside the Kenta restaurant and immediately turn right down the steps to find an intimate taproom with a tiny bar in a cubby hole at the side, added in July 2022. Beyond the public area is a series of rooms with more space than you might expect, with an 8 hl mash tun and copper nested inside each other to save space, plus a pilot kit. The premises were briefly occupied by Hoppy Collie brewery in 2013 but there's no connection between the two businesses.

BEERS are naturally fermented in keg, with a plan to resume bottling, as well as adding cask once turnover justifies it. Unusually for London, they're predominantly in modestly hopped, balanced session styles. The range hasn't quite stabilised but is likely to include changing **Gold** summer ales (around 4%), ambers, stouts and **HPA**s (Hoppy Pale Ales, around 4.5%).

Upgraded from Trv also. When chef Michael Gratz started a street food business in 2013, he naturally drew on his heritage as a native of Kansas City, Missouri, the US capital of smoked meat. Also a keen craft beer fan who collaborated with brewers, he brought these two highly compatible bedfellows together at this permanent site. Lockdown struck just months after opening in December 2019, but the venue has kept going. It should soon be joined by other hospitality businesses in a run of well-located Central Line arches opposite the northwest corner of the giant Westfield mall and close to the former BBC Television Centre. The funky US-inspired bar with high stools and tables, also open to non-diners, occupies one arch, offering a very varied all-independent keg range drawn from London (Goodness, Mondo, Kernel, Old Street) and elsewhere in the UK (Lost and Grounded, North, Seven Bro7ers, Wild), with tasting paddles available. The arch next door has more traditional restaurant tables at which to eniov exemplary renditions of oak-smoked brisket sandwiches, pulled pork and smoked wings, with sides including tater tots and mac and cheese. Given the carnivorous slant, the veggie burgers are pretty good too, and staff can make matching recommendations. 03/22

TfL Ravenscourt Park

Upgraded from Try also. The Guinness mosaics that dot the floor of this big Brewer's Tudor place round the corner from Ravenscourt Park Tube reveal its previous life as an Irish pub. More recently a Laine's known as the Rooks Nest, it was refurbished and reopened in September 2020 under the Big Smoke-Young's partnership. It still stocks Laine's alongside Big Smoke and well-chosen guests likely to be from Londoners like Two Tribes, and reliable producers from elsewhere like Deya, Harvey's and Mad Squirrel. As with other pubs in the chain, the furnishings are smart but comfortable and unpretentious, mixing banquettes, stools and table seating. Food encompasses hot sandwiches (fish finger, halloumi), sausage and mash, barbecue pork ribs, sharers like loaded fries and nachos, and, thanks to the upstairs rooms, breakfast and brunch. 03/22

Cuckoo brewer Wolfpack's (see Brewers without breweries) newest venue, opened in summer 2021 as a refurb of the former Jolly Maltster, offers the biggest beer range of the three in the most pubby venue, with remnants of engraved screens and half-panelling. Besides three or four Wolfpack brands there's an interesting range of other kegs, including Deva, Gipsy Hill and Belgians De Halve Maan and Delirium Tremens when I called. Self-proclaimed 'luxury junk food' includes burgers and wings, with veggie options. All the Wolfpack venues are sporty, lively and youthful, and this one is no exception, but has an attractive side garden and a great location overlooking a picturesque little square a short step from Fulham Broadway and Chelsea FC. 08/23

TfL Kilburn Park

Following a dramatic tale of demolition and restoration (see below), this handsome place on the northern edge of Paddington Recreation Ground reopened in April 2021 and is now a flourishing independently run community local. The spacious interior still distinguishes the public bar on the right with wooden seating and saloon bar on the left with leather-padded banquettes. A rear dining area abuts a terrace that backs directly onto the park, and framed prints and old books give a homely feel. Beers are nearly all from London brewers, including an exclusive cask bitter from Anspach & Hobday, with Five Points, Goodness, London Brewing and Southwark also likely to pop up. Food mixes cooked bar snacks, lunchtime sandwiches and small plates (creamy wild mushrooms, tempura cod cheeks) with mains like steaks, jerk chicken burgers and unusual salads. A welcome bolthole in a part of London where decent beer is relatively scarce, it deservedly won local CAMRA Pub of the Year in 2022 and not just for its backstory. 08/22

Visitor note. Despite appearances, this is a recent reconstruction. In 2015, developers intent on building flats on the site began unlawfully demolishing the original pub, built in 1921 and recognised for its heritage features, days before it was due a Grade II listing. Westminster council, supported by a vociferous local campaign, took legal action, forcing an unprecedented brick-by-brick rebuild. The appearance and layout have been retained, with some subtle practical tweaks to the latter. As much as possible was rescued from the rubble and reinstated, including the bar, fireplaces, tiling, brickwork and parts of ceilings. The exterior ceramic signs promoting original owner Charringtons are particularly attractive: note the one at the side labelling the dining area as 'Luncheon and Tea Room'. Paddington Recreation Ground opened in 1888 as the first park of its kind in London: Roger Bannister trained for his four-minute mile here in the early 1950s.

TfL Westbourne Park Cy Q16 Wk Link to Grand Union Canal Walk

Next door to Westbourne Park Tube, this old pub reopened in November 2023 as Forest Hill's first proper pub venue, stocking all their regular beers and specials in keg and can, with a rare opportunity to sample some of them from cask, alongside food options that might include jerk chicken, black and white quinoa salad or a variety of burgers. It's a stripped back space about a central bar with comfortable tables and a lively but friendly vibe that belies the somewhat ironic name. 08/23

Visitor note. Built in 1875, the same year as the original Westbourne Park station, the pub was originally named the Metropolitan after the railway company that founded what became the London Underground.

HERITAGE PUBS

Warrington Hotel 93 Warrington Crescent W9 1EH thewarringtonhotel.co.uk. This lavish pub in well-heeled Maida Vale, built in 1857 and reworked in the 1890s, changed owners several times recently and was closed and for sale again when I was compiling the book. Happily, it reopened in July 2021. Beyond the imposing stucco exterior with its bespoke lamp standards and elaborately tiled and pillared porch is an astonishing lounge bar on the right with an arcade of wood and marble, sparkling stained and engraved glass and mildly erotic art nouveau decorations added to the moulded canopy above the bar in 1965. Pioneering pub chronicler Maurice Gorham named it "the finest flower of lounges" in 1949. A few beers of interest from Adnams and Portobello, including the odd cask, and boutique B&B rooms upstairs. A short walk from another heritage pub, the Prince Alfred (p306). Three-star heritage rating. 08/22

UPDATES AND CORRECTIONS

Real Drinks Notting Hill closed by June 2022. The Little Venice branch is still open but the original shop in Twickenham (p312) is also now closed. *12/22*

Outer West London

LONDON HEATHROW AIRPORT

Big Smoke opened two additional airport bars in June 2022, both before security. The **Oceanic** is named after Terminal 3's original name: it's around the corner from security on level 1. The **Globe** is on Level 3 of Terminal 5, behind the Zone G check-in desks. Both have a similar offer to the Taphouse at Terminal 2. *12/22*

The **Flying Chariot** closed during the 2020 lockdowns and Wetherspoon later confirmed they wouldn't be reopening it. In July 2022, it reopened as a second Fuller's airport outlet, the **Queens Arms**, recalling Terminal 2's original name the Queen's Terminal, so it's once again worth a look for a decent beer if you're at the airport. The other airport Wetherspoon mentioned, the Crown Rivers on airside Terminal 5, remains open. *12/22*

CTZN Brewhouse. Both brewery and venue are now closed: see under Southwest London: Outer Southwest London. *01/22*

Mad Yank Brewery. Sadly, the company submitted a voluntary application to wind itself up in March 2023. *05/23*

Queens Head. The last time I looked, this Uxbridge pub had only Greene King and well-known national cask brands. *08/23*

Real Drinks. The original shop, a pioneer when it opened in 2005, closed in late July 2022. Only the Little Venice branch (p306) remains open. *12/22*

Tiny Vessel Brewing Co. Brewing on the 3 hl kit was suspended during 2021 as the main outlet, the Northumberland Arms, closed for refurbishment. Activity resumed in March 2022 and the pub reopened six months later: see under Ealing and Chiswick above.

BEERS in bottle and keg are available from the pub and online \checkmark . Core brands are flagship **Summit Else** (5.2%) lightly spiced English IPA; **London Fog*** (6.9%), a New England IPA but on the less fruity, soupy side; and **Double Date** (7.4%) Belgian-style brown ale with dates. A cask-only chocolate porter, **Dark Matter** (4.5%, not tasted) appears in winter. *08/23*

THE REST

Breweries outside London

Thamesside Brewery. The brewery had to move twice since the book was published, but as of 8 December 2022 has what is hopefully a more permanent home at the Two Rivers shopping centre: 1 Hale Street, Staines upon Thames TW18 4UW. The taproom is normally open daily but check for times (thamessidebrewery.co.uk). *05/23*

Titsey Brewing Co has a new taproom with fine views on the North Downs Way at Clarkes Lane Farm, Tatsfield TN16 2JU. There's also a new online shop. \oplus *Th* 12.00-22.00, *Fr* 10.00-23.00, *Sa* 09.00-23.00, *Su* 09.00-22.00. *08/23*

Brewers without breweries

Allsopp's (Samuel Allsopp and Sons) is an historic brewing name from Burton upon Trent revived in Autumn 2021 by a London-based business with family credentials. The history dates from around 1730 when Benjamin Wilson brewed in his pub. His great nephew Samuel Allsopp bought the business in 1807 and helped build it into one of Burton's biggest, noted as the first in the town to export India Pale Ale, from 1823. In 1935 it merged with Ind Coope, later Allied Breweries and, from 1992, Carlsberg, which sold its Burton site to what's now Molson Coors in 1997. by which time most of the original Allsopp buildings had been demolished. Former city financier Jamie Allsopp, seven times great grandson of Samuel, bought the brand back from Carlsberg. acquired the historic red hand trademark, which had been sold to BrewDog, retrieved the yeast from the National Yeast Archives and developed revived versions of some of the beers with the help of National Brewery Centre brewer Jim Appelbee. The hope is eventually to open a new brewery in Burton but meanwhile beers in cask and bottle are contracted, currently I believe at Curious Brew in Kent and Otter in Devon. They're available in several London pubs including some former Allsopp houses. Current brews are Pale Ale (4.4%) and India Pale Ale* (5.6%); a lager is imminent and one of the brewery's most famous brands, Arctic Ale barley wine, may yet be revived. Thanks to Roger Warhurst for some of the background allsopps.com 08/22

Better World's Lowline Tap in Walworth closed on 26 May 2023 due to economic pressures, though the company is still brewing for the time being. **BEERS** in keg and can have been brewed at Pretty Decent (p150), Glen Affric in Merseyside and Farm Yard in Lancashire. They include **Polar** Citra pale ale (4.6%), **Wolf*** helles lager (4.7%), **Pallas*** stout (5%), **Hog*** hazy IPA (6%) and **Lynx** double IPA (7.6%). **betterworldbeer.com** 08/23

Big Drop. Another low alcohol specialist that should have been in the book, this was founded by Rob Fink and James Kindred with the help of ex-Wild Beer brewer Johnny Clayton in October 2016 to brew 0.5% ABV beers in can and keg in a variety of styles from lager to brown ale. UK production has been largely at Fourpure in Bermondsey for some time, and in May 2023 brewery owner In Good Company strengthened its relationship with the brand through a licensing deal. The beers are also brewed in Australia and the USA for local markets. **bigdropbrew.com** 08/23

Boxcar, as reported under East: Tower Hamlets, is currently a cuckoo, working at sites including

Fierce in Aberdeen, with the dark mild made at Drop Project. **boxcarbrewery.co.uk** *08/23*

BritHop now has its own brewery, but not in London: it's taken on the former Franklins site in Bexhill, East Sussex, after its former owners expanded to a site near Brighton. *03/22*

Coalition Brewing has been using the former SlyBeast brewery at the Ram Inn in Wandsworth: see under Southwest London.

Common Rioters has finally opened the Green Goddess pub and is shortly to commence brewing there: see Southeast London: Greenwich and Lewisham. *08/22*

Lucky Saint. I overlooked this low-alcohol lager specialist in the book, but it's recently opened a pub of the same name: see Central: Soho and Fitzrovia. *08/23*

Macintosh Ales is now a cuckoo brewer: see North: Islington to Stoke Newington. *08/*23

Mellor's. Originally a home-based small batch brewery founded by Josh Mellor in 2021 in the Haringey ladder, this moved to Suffolk just before press date and consequently appeared in the Been and Gone section (p327). But the new location didn't work out, and by early 2022 Josh was back in London, this time in Deptford, and working for BBNo (see Southeast London: Bermondsey). He's still cuckoo brewing his own beers as a side project using various hosts. **mellorsbrewing.co.uk** 08/22

More Lash (4.5%, not tasted) is a contractbrewed canned lager claiming to originate from Clapham which first appeared in spring 2022. The brand is fronted by comedy podcaster Archie Curzon, known for his parodies of southwest London 'rugby lads', though he's not listed among the registered company directors. For every can sold, 10p is donated to rugby players' charity Restart Rugby. **morelashbrewery.com** 08/22

Rock Leopard Brewing Co. Following a successful crowdfunding round in May 2022, the company has found a unit at the new development of Cygnet Square, Thamesmead. A hoped-for 2022 opening was delayed and the taproom and onsite 15 hl brewery are now planned for spring or early summer 2023. The community-focused facility will work with nearby Shooters Hill College to provide NVQ training facilities. *12/22*

So What Brewing Co. See under Bullfinch above.

Standard Brew Co. Milo Oddi worked for Beer + Burger (p304) and related nanobrewery Project 88 (p327). He launched his own cuckoo project in July 2021, brewing at One Mile End, a previous partner of Project 88. The company focuses on IPAs but pursues variety within the broad style. Besides a recurring core table IPA ideal for serving alongside food, a new recipe is sent out every month as a six-pack to subscribers, a model which helps build a community of customers in the absence of a taproom. There's still a link to B+B as the owners of that company are investors in Standard and their venues sometimes stock its beer in keg form. Milo has no immediate plans to add his own kit as he's happy working as a cuckoo brewer and collaborator: a brew at 40FT is planned for the autumn. **standardbrew.co**. 08/22

Toast Ale now has a taproom, Good Company: see Central London: Soho and Fitzrovia. *08*/23

Tankleys Brewery. I finally tasted the Hawaiian Pizza Beer and can confirm it's fully worthy of a mention, more smoked than sweet. *12/21*

Truman's Beer. Following the closure of its Hackney Wick site in May 2022, Truman's became a cuckoo brewer. In September 2022 it was renamed **Big Penny** following the sale of the Truman brand, which may yet result in another brewer without a brewery: see under East London: Hackney. **bigpenny.co.uk** *08/23*

Young & Co's Brewery. As stated in the book, when Young's quit the Ram brewery in Wandsworth in 2006, production of its beer brands transferred to Charles Wells' Eagle brewery in Bedford. In 2017, Wells sold the Eagle, its core brands and its interest in the Young's brands to Marston's. Wells continued as a pub company but returned to brewing on a small scale in 2020 with a brewpub. Brewpoint, on a new site in Bedford, though with a new portfolio of beers. The same year, Marston's sold its brewing side, including the Eagle, which was still hosting the Young's beers, to Carlsberg, creating the Carlsberg Marston's Brewing Company (CMBC). In late 2022, CMBC in turn sold the Eagle to Barcelona-based brewer Estrella Damm, whose brands it had long produced and distributed under license. The regular Young's cask brands are now brewed at Wychwood in Witney. Oxfordshire, while seasonal Winter Warmer is made at Marston's Albion brewery in Burton upon Trent, which also does all the bottling. 08/23

Wolfpack now offers several other branded beers besides its flagship lager, including a pilsner and a session IPA. Besides Greene King, some is brewed by GK subsidiary Belhaven in Dunbar, East Lothian, Scotland, but the company remains independent and uses other, undisclosed, brewing partners too. See under West: Hammersmith and Fulham for a full review of the Fulham bar. 08/23

Been, gone and standing by

BritHop no longer plans to brew in London: see Brewers without breweries. *03/22*

Common Rioters has finally opened the Green Goddess pub and is shortly to commence brewing there: see Southeast London: Greenwich and Lewisham. *08/22*

Plans for **Earth Station HQ** have been kicked into the long grass as the redoubtable Jenn Merrick was appointed as managing director of Big Smoke Brewery in Esher (listed under Breweries outside London) in January 2022. I'm sure she'll do great things there. *01/22*

The brewhouse at the **Florence**, which previously operated as Florence, Head in a Hat and Craft Academy but had been mothballed since 2018, has finally been removed. *08/23*

Busy music venue the Fox and Firkin (316 Lewisham High Street SE13 6JZ) is due to become a brewpub in 2023 with a facility known as the Firkin brewery added in a former Sainsbury's depot on Whitburn Road at the back as part of a major expansion. Behind the plans are pub owner Didier Autard and brewing consultant Hugo Anderson, a longstanding brewer with AB InBev. Tim Denlisoz has been appointed head brewer and in June 2023 was commissioning the equipment with the intention of having beers on sale in late summer. This is the second time the pub, formerly the Black Bull, has operated as a brewpub. In 1980 it became the second in David Bruce's chain of Firkin brewpubs following the Goose and Firkin (see Southwark Ale p91) and continued to serve its own beer until new owners Punch discontinued brewing across the chain in 1999. It's one of the few to retain its Firkin-era name. 08/23

Guinness is set to start brewing in London again, though on a much smaller scale than at its former Park Royal site, briefly the world's biggest brewery when it opened in 1937 but closed in 2005 and subsequently demolished (p307). The new site has an even older brewing history: the Woodyard Brewery, later known as Combe & Co, on Shelton Street near Seven Dials in Covent Garden WC2, was likely founded in the 1640s. It became a major porter producer and was at one point London's fifth biggest brewery. It closed in 1905 after merging with two other breweries to form Watney Combe Reid, but several historic buildings still stand along Shelton and Earlham Streets. Appropriately enough, the Watney group ended up in the hands of Grand Metropolitan, later a co-founder of Guinness owner Diageo. The company announced on 31 January 2022 that it's investing £75 million to create a microbrewery,

bar-restaurant, shop, training centre, events space and "culture hub" called **Guinness at Old Brewers Yard**. Plans were delayed by planning issues but permission has now been granted and the site should open in 2024. *08/23*

Hop Stuff has been bought and reopened as **SALT London**: see under Southeast London: Greenwich and Lewisham above. *03/22*

Having started in London in 2021, then moved out just before press date, **Mellor's** is now back as a cuckoo. See Brewers without Breweries. *08/22*

Plum Tree no longer plans to add a brewery. *03/22*

Rock Leopard has moved a major step closer to opening its own facility. See Brewers without Breweries. *08/22*

As reported above, Barnet, BBNo Bermondsey (but not Greenwich), CTZN, East Side, Enefeld, Greywood, Jeffersons, Mad Yank, Old Kent Road, OMEBEER (formerly One Mile End), Parakeet City, Solvay Society and Three Sods have closed; Earth Ales, London Beer Factory, Partizan. Three Hills. Weird Beard and, likely. Magic Spells have moved out of London: and brewing at Big Penny (formerly Truman's), Boxcar, Brewhouse and Kitchen Islington, By the Horns, Canopy, Crate, E5 Bakehouse, Fearless Nomad, Gorgeous, Laine's Brew Lab, London Fields (due to be revived as Saint Monday), Macintosh Ales, Old Fountain, Queens Head (formerly Goose Island Brewpub), Spartan, St Mary's, Urban Alchemy, Volden and Wrong Side of the Tracks is currently suspended, with cuckoo production continuing in some cases. With SALT London reviving the former Hop Stuff, the previously unnoticed Hammersmith, the revived Babel (formerly Little Creatures), Ealing returning to brewing at its original site as Marko Paulo, Coalition cuckoo brewing at Laine's Ram Inn (formerly SlyBeast), Husk now with a new site and new arrivals 3 Locks, BrewDog Waterloo, Great Beyond and Roundwood Project, this brings London's current total of operating commercial breweries to 113, suggesting a continued decline from the high point at the end of 2021 when 133 breweries were operating. 07/23

Chains, pubcos and brewery pubs

Barworks. As recorded above, the company sold 13 of its sites to Urban Pubs and Bars in October. The sites it has retained largely focus on spirits and cocktails, so it's no longer of great interest from a beer point of view. *12/21*

Big Smoke/Twickenham Taverns. The Big Smoke Pub Co confirmed on 25 July 2023 that it was placed into administration then bought out by undisclosed new owners. All the pubs remain open and no staff have been laid off, at least for the moment, which is good news. But the development inevitably raises concerns for a potential narrowing of the beer range, and questions about the future of the Big Smoke brewery, now based just outside London in Esher under the leadership of star brewer Jenn Merrick and a major supplier to the pubs. The brewery is a separate company, unaffected by the sale, so it's possible new owners would be less inclined to support it. Cofounder Richard Craig insists, though, that "the pubs will continue to trade in exactly the same way" and that the brewery "will continue to supply the pub company as well as our other customers", and it's rumoured that there are family connections between both old and new owners, so perhaps we'll see little change. The deal doesn't affect the Twickenham Taverns pubs, which are owned by a different but associated company. It's unclear how it will impact on the company's 'expert partnership' with Punch, which has yielded several new outlets covered in these updates. I've flagged up the pubs potentially affected in the Updates and corrections entries above and will continue to monitor the situation. 08/23

Graceland will begin brewing for its own outlets during 2023 following its acquisition of London Fields Brewery (see East London: Hackney) which it will rename St Monday. The move seems appropriate given that the company spun off Barworks, which played a role in the original expansion of Camden Town Brewery. *08/23*

Laine's London estate no longer includes a brewpub so all its own-brand beer is now from the main brewery in Sussex: see People's Park Tavern above under East London: Hackney. The group was included as part of the deal when Fortress bought Punch in December 2021. 03/22

Mother Kelly's plans to add several new outlets, more focused on drinking in as owner Nigel Owen says that since the end of the lockdowns this has become a more important side of the business than takeaway beer. A Tottenham site has already opened and a Barking site will follow. See Try also under North: Tottenham and Haringey and East: Outer East respectively. *08/23*

Punch's owner Vine was bought out by US-based private equity investor Fortress, already owner of Majestic Wine, in December 2021. The deal included all the Young's pubs recently bought by Punch, plus the Laine group (above). There have been signs of consolidation, with for example Laine beers appearing in former Young's and other Punch pubs. *03/22*

Heritage pubs

The Pub Heritage Group changed its classification method for heritage pubs in April 2023. Rather than the confusing separate registers for pub interiors of national and regional importance and 'some regional interest', there's now a single national inventory with entries graded using a star system. There are three grades:

- *** Exceptional national historic importance, staying largely intact for the last 50 years or retaining features that are truly rare.
- ** Outstanding national historic interest, of somewhat lower intactness or rarity.
- * Special national historic interest, retaining historic layouts or exceptional features but with significant changes.

Though the new gradings are roughly equivalent to the old classifications, all the pubs have been regraded and some have moved bands. Current grades for venues listed in the book and subsequent updates are as follows:
